
Festive mood at the Borders



Diwali celebrates the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness. One to two weeks before Diwali, people start cleaning and painting their houses to welcome Goddess Lakshmi. On Dhanteras, people go shopping for Small Murtis (idols) of Goddess Lakshmi and God Ganesha,gold, silver, utensils, decoration materials, and new purchases. A day before Diwali, the work of decorating begins. People make rangolis and different patterns using colorful paints on the floors of their houses and decorate them with lights and garlands of marigold flowers. On the night of Diwali, a unique aspect is the worship of Goddess Lakshmi and God Ganesha for prosperity, with diyas placed all over the house. A variety of traditional delights that reflect the region's rich culinary heritage are prepared. 
