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
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

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पुण्यात वसलेल्या काही ऐतिहासिक आणि प्रसिद्ध वास्तूंपैकी एक म्हणजे महात्मा फुले यांचा वाडा. चला तर, मुलींसाठी पहिली शाळा सुरू करणाऱ्या या महान व्यक्तिमत्त्वाबद्दल व त्यांच्या प्रसिद्ध वाड्याबद्दल या लेखाद्वारे माहिती मिळवूया.

प्यामध्ये अशा काही पवित्र वास्तू आहेत की ज्या बोलायला लागल्या, तर पुण्यातील सामाजिक, शैक्षणिक, सांस्कृतिक घडामोडींचे चित्र उभे करतील. त्या चित्रांमध्ये सामाजिक परिवर्तनाची मुळे खोलवर रुजलेली दिसतील. त्यांतील एक महत्त्वाची वास्तू म्हणजे गंज पेठेतील महात्मा फुले यांचा वाडा! येथे आता महात्मा फुले यांच्याविषयी संग्रहालय उभे केले आहे. हे संग्रहालय पाहण्यासाठी सर्वांना खुले आहे. हा वाडा १९२२ मध्ये 'श्री. सावता माळी फ्री बोर्डिंग'चे आश्रयदाते श्री. बाळासाहेब कोरे यांनी अर्जुना पाटील बोवा यांच्याकडून १५०० रुपयांच्या बदल्यात खरेदी केला. १९२२ पासून या ठिकाणी 'श्री सावता माळी फ्री बोर्डिंग' चालिवले जात होते. त्याचे १९६९मध्ये 'महात्मा फुले वसतिगृह' असे नामकरण केले. ही वास्तू १९७२मध्ये राज्य संरक्षित स्मारक महणून आणि १० डिसेंबर १९९३ रोजी भारताचे राष्ट्रपती

डॉ. शंकर दयाळ शर्मा यांच्या हस्ते राष्ट्रीय स्मारक म्हणून घोषित. या परिसराला आता 'समता भूमी' असे म्हणतात.

महात्मा जोतिबा फुले यांचा जन्म ११ एप्रिल, १८२७ रोजी पुरंदर तालुक्यातील खानवडी या गावी झाला. पुणे शहरातील गंजपेठ या भागातील सामाजिक चळवळीचे आद्य प्रवर्तक म्हणून ओळखल्या जाणाऱ्या महात्मा जोतिबा फुले व त्यांच्या धर्मपत्नी क्रांतिज्योती सावित्रीबाई फुले यांचे या वाड्यात वास्तव्य होते. समाजसुधारणेशी निगडीत हजारो घटनांचा तसेच लाखो क्रांतिकारी विचारांच्या मंथनाचा हा वाडा साक्षीदार आहे. याच वाड्यातून सावित्रीबाईंनी शिक्षणाचे धडे गिरवून पुढे स्त्री शिक्षणाची मुहूर्तमेढ रोवली. सावित्रीबाई फुले यांना भारताच्या पहिल्या आद्य शिक्षिका असे संबोधले जाते.

दगड-विटात बांधलेल्या, कौलारू छप्पर असलेल्या व शेणा-मातीने सारवलेल्या या वाड्यात महात्मा जोतिबा फुले व क्रांतिज्योती सावित्रीबाई फुले यांच्या पाऊलखुणा उमटलेल्या आहेत. या पाऊलखुणांची धूळ मस्तकाला लावण्यासाठी देश-विदेशातून हजारो लोक या ठिकाणी येत असतात व या दोन पुण्यात्म्यांच्या वास्तव्याने पुनीत झालेल्या या वास्तूला स्पर्श करून धन्य होतात.

या वाड्याची रचना एकोणिसाव्या शतकातील घरांची रचना दर्शविते. मुख्य दरवाजा बारका आहे. तिथुन प्रवेश केल्यावर ओसरी आहे. त्यापुढे चौकोनी तीन खणांची दीड मजला दुघयी खोली आहे. ही त्या वेळची बैठकीची खोली. त्याला लागून २० पावले लांब आणि ५ पावले रुंद अशी लांबलचक खोली लागते. या जागेत घरातील मंडळी राहत. या खोलीतून बाहेर पडण्यासाठी एक छोटासा दरवाजा आहे. त्याच्या डाव्या बाजूला परत एक चार पावले रुंद व १२-१३ पावले लांब अशी खोली आहे. येथे बहुतेककरून स्वयंपाक होत असावा. या खोलीतून बाहेर पडल्यावर मोठे कुंपण असलेले अंगण लागते. या अंगणामध्ये विहीर आहे. विहिरीतून पाणी काढण्यासाठी रहाट, दोर व बादली आहे. विहिरीला कठडा बांधला आहे. आता येथे संरक्षक भिंत बांधली आहे. संरक्षक भिंतीच्या बाहेर जोतिबांची रक्षा येथे जिमनीत पुरली आहे. त्यावर सावित्रीबाईंनी शिला ठेवलेली आहे. त्या ठिकाणी आता तुळशीवृंदावन बांधलेले आहे. आजूबाजूची घरे पाहा. तीही विटा आणि मातीमध्ये बांधलेली, तुळ्यावर आणि कडी-पाटावर उभारलेली दिसतात. वरच्या घरावर तिरके छप्पर आहे. येथे आजही हिंदू, मुसलमान, दलित अशी संमिश्र वस्ती आहे. दोन घरांमधील अंतर बोळकंडीसारखे आहे. एका वेळी एक-दोन माणसे, एखादा बैल अथवा गाय जाण्याएवढी जागा आहे. एकोणिसाव्या शतकातील गणेशपेठेतील घरे आणि वस्ती यांचे प्रतिबिंब येथे उमटते.



या वस्तीमध्ये आपल्या छोट्या घरामध्ये जोतिबा फुले व त्यांची पत्नी सावित्रीबाई फुले यांनी संसार थाटला. जोतिबा फुले १८९०मध्ये आणि सावित्रीबाई फुले १८९७मध्ये प्लेगमुळे मरण पावल्या.

वाड्यामध्ये आत शिरल्यावर बैठकीच्या खोलीमध्ये जोतिबांचे छायाचित्र आहे. त्यावरून त्यांचा पोशाख, अंगकाठी आणि दूरदर्शी नजर लक्षात येते. परिस्थितीशी मुकाबला करण्याची जिद्द या छायाचित्रांमधून लक्षात येते.

त्याच्या खाली पितळी अक्षरांत कोरलेले वुईलपत्र (मृत्युपत्र) मराठीमध्ये दिले आहे. हे मृत्युपत्र फुले यांनी १० जुलै १८८७ रोजी केले आहे. त्यात त्यांनी आपला धंदा कॉन्ट्रॅक्टर म्हणून लिहिलेला आहे. पुढे सावित्रीबाईंना पुत्रप्राप्ती न झाल्यामुळे यशवंत या मुलास दत्तक घेतल्याची माहिती आहे. त्यापुढे त्यांच्याकडे असलेल्या स्थावर मिळकतीचा तपशील दिलेला आहे. त्या घराची लांबी-रुंदी दिली आहे. त्यापुढे काही बखळ जागा आहेत. त्याचे वर्णन केले आहे. त्यापुढे आपला वारस यशवंत यांनी काय करावे, ही अपेक्षा व्यक्त केली आहे.

ते म्हणतात, चिरंजीव यशवंताने आपले सर्वोपरी गांजलेले, अज्ञानी, दीनदुबळ्या, शुद्रादि अतिशूद्र मानव बांधवास त्यांचे मानवी अधिकारांचे हक्क त्यांस समजावून देऊन त्यांची धूर्त, ठक, मानवद्रोही आर्यभट, ब्राह्मणांचे कचाट्यापासून सुटका करण्याच्या कामी आपले आयुष्य, आपले सर्वस्व खर्ची घालून जन्माचे सार्थक करून घ्यावे. त्यापुढे आपल्या मृत्यूनंतर सर्व विधी सत्यशोधक समाजाच्या पद्धतीप्रमाणे करावेत, अशी इच्छा व्यक्त केली आहे. या मृत्युपत्रावरून त्यांचा तळागाळातील समाजातील व्यक्तींचा उद्धार करण्याचा मनसुबा दिसून येतो.

समाजकार्याच्या उद्धाराचे कार्य अविरत सुरू असताना जुलै १८८८मध्ये त्यांना अर्धांगवातांचे आजार सुरू झाला व शोवटी आजारपणातच २८ नोव्हेंबर १८९० रोजी महात्मा जोतिबांची प्राणज्योत याच वाड्यात मावळली. वाड्याच्या प्रांगणात जोतिबांच्या अस्थी विसावी, आहेत. पुढे सावित्रीबाईंनी जोतिबांनी सुरू केलेल्या कार्यात स्वतःला वाहन घेऊन त्यांचे कार्य पुढे सुरू ठेवले.

महात्मा फुले वाडा गंज पेठ, पुणे हे स्मारक शासन निर्णय क्र. एएनएम. १०६९/क्यू/८५०६१ दि. ०४/०५/१९७२ अन्वये 'राज्य संरक्षित स्मारक' म्हणून घोषित करण्यात आले आहे



The Hidden Gem of Pune: Exploring the Legacy of Ram Mandir, Tulsibaug

Ram Mandir in Tulsi Baug, Pune, is an 18th-century temple known for its stunning architecture and a 74-foot-tall intricately designed spire. It's rich historical essence is significant and it's also known as the heart of city.

Pune, known for its rich history and vibrant urban life, hides many treasures that often go unnoticed by both locals and tourists. One such gem is the Ram Mandir at Tulsibaug, a lesser-known but significant temple that carries not only religious importance but also echoes of the city's cultural and historical heritage. During my visit, I discovered that this temple is not just a place of worship; it's a testament to the enduring faith of the people of Pune.

Unveiling the Temple's Roots

The Ram Mandir has its origins in the Maratha period, likely dating back to the

Though there is no clear record of its exact founding, it is believed that local devotees, possibly with the support of Maratha rulers like BajiRao-I and Nana Saheb, built the temple during a time when the revival of Hindu practices was an important cultural endeavor. The Ram Mandir stands as a symbol of this period of resurgence, offering a place of solace and worship during a time of political turbulence.

As I stood at the temple, I was reminded of the historical context – a time when Marathas sought to preserve Hindu

culture and revive temples that had been neglected or destroyed. The Ram Mandir, with its connection to the Maratha Empire, has remained a steady point of reference for generations of devotees, symbolizing resilience and religious pride.

As an outsider to Pune, I was intrigued by the stories I'd heard of the Ram Mandir and its significance to the locals. Upon arriving, I was initially caught off guard by the bustling market that surrounds the temple. The narrow streets of Tulsibaug are teeming with vendors selling everything from incense to religious icons, creating an atmosphere that is both lively and chaotic. Finding the temple amidst all the commotion proved to be a bit more challenging than I had anticipated.

Yet, once I entered the temple's gates, I felt an immediate shift. The bustling market outside faded away, replaced by a sense of peace and calm. The quiet interior, filled with the soft hum of prayers, allowed me to sit in reflection for nearly an hour, observing the steady flow of devotees coming and going. It was a rare experience, offering a deep sense of spiritual connection that transcended the noise of the world outside.

Timeless Architecture, Quiet Beauty

What struck me most about the Ram Mandir was its simplicity. Unlike the grandiose temples that dominate many parts of India, the Ram Mandir does not seek attention with its size or grandeur. Instead, its architectural beauty lies in the delicate carvings, intricate details, and the humble charm that surrounds the entire

structure. The main sanctum houses the idols of Lord Rama, Sita, and Lakshman, with carvings that narrate stories from the Ramayana, embodying virtues like righteousness, devotion, and loyalty.

The temple's structure is a fine example of Maratha-era architecture, using traditional techniques and local materials that create an atmosphere of quiet reverence. It is a reminder that true beauty often comes from simplicity and purpose, rather than ostentation.

More Than Just a Place of Worship

While the Ram Mandir is undoubtedly a spiritual center, it also plays an important role in the community life of Pune. The temple becomes a vibrant hub during Ram Navami, the annual celebration of Lord Rama's birth. During this festival, the streets surrounding the temple are filled with music, processions, and devotion. For the people of Pune, Ram Navami is not only a spiritual occasion but a time for the community to come together, reinforcing the values of bhakti (devotion) and unity.

During Ram Navami, the Ram Mandir becomes a hub for cultural celebrations, with lively processions and music filling the streets around it!

One thing that struck me during my visit was the palpable sense of togetherness that filled the air. Devotees of all ages, backgrounds, and walks of life gathered together to pray and celebrate. The shared experience of faith and devotion was evident everywhere — in the smiles of the elderly, the excitement of the children,

and the collective reverence of the crowd. It was clear that the Ram Mandir serves not only as a place for individual devotion but as a vital part of the cultural fabric of Pune.

Even outside of the festival period, the temple is a hub of daily rituals, with arti (prayer ceremonies) conducted regularly. These rituals provide a sense of continuity and connection for the people, offering a moment of spiritual grounding in the midst of their busy lives.

The Maratha Legacy and Cultural Significance



Oune, also known as the "Oxford of the East," is a city that has a rich history, vibrant student culture, a pleasant climate, and is home to prestigious universities. One of the most notable institutions is The Film and Television Institute of India (FTII), known for its excellence in film and television education. FTII, established in 1960, has played a pivotal role in making Pune a hub for both education and cinema. The institute has gained worldwide featuring recognition, in Variety magazine's 2018 list of top film schools and ranking among the top ten film institutes in CEO World Magazine in 2019. Dhiraj Singh is the current Director of FTII. With 28 years of experience in media and public policy, including roles in the Press Information Bureau and other government positions, his leadership aims to further enhance FTII's legacy in film

and TV education.

Legacy of Prabhat Film Company

'FTII'—just hearing the name excites any film enthusiast, but the history behind it is as compelling as its name. In 1933, Prabhat Film Company moved from Kolhapur to Pune, choosing the city for its steady electricity supply and proximity to Mumbai, the heart of Indian cinema. A piece of land on a hill near Law College Road in Pune was acquired, and two large shooting studios were built. The company's logo -a woman holding a Totari against the background of a rising sun-depicted its progressive attitude. To sustain its business, Prabhat focused on mythological films but also produced meaningful cinema that contributed to the freedom struggle and social awareness. Once a powerhouse of cinema, Prabhat Film Company gradually lost its glory in the 1950s.

Foundation of FTII

As Prabhat Film Company closed, the Indian government searched for a space to establish an institute dedicated to providing film education to the new generation of Young India. Prabhat's premises were recommended by The Film Inquiry Committee, led by S. K. Patil, along with veteran filmmakers V. Shantaram and P. N. Sarkar (who were tasked by the Union Government to suggest reforms for the film industry). On March 20, 1960, the Film Institute of India began operations, inheriting two film studios—one of which was Asia's largest at the time. The responsibility of shaping young minds was actor-director Gajanan entrusted to Jagirdar, the first principal of the institute. Under his leadership, FTII rapidly gained recognition as the Pune Film Institute, both nationally and internationally.

Growth and Expansion

In 1971, FTII expanded with the establishment of its television wing, becoming the Film and Television Institute of India. By 1974, it was registered as a society under the Societies Registration Act of 1860. The institute is overseen by a Governing Council, with its academic and financial affairs managed by respective committees.

FTII offers 11 film and TV courses lasting 1 to 3 years, admitting 112 students annually. Its alumni have shaped Indian cinema, enriching both regional and mainstream filmmaking with diverse social themes.

Infrastructure and Facilities at FTII

FTII offers state-of-the-art

infrastructure, advanced equipment, and world-class facilities to train students in filmmaking and television production. The institute ensures hands-on experience with cutting-edge technology, providing a strong foundation for aspiring filmmakers, cinematographers, editors, and sound designers.

The old Prabhat studios were upgraded with HD television studios, screening theatres, and the Satish Bahadur Classroom-Theatre Complex. The institute also developed an advanced editing and sound department, a film processing lab, and a library with a vast collection of books and international resources. Equipment such as professionalgrade ARRI and RED Digital Cinema Cameras, Blackmagic and Sony Cinema Cameras, Panther and Chapman Dollies, Jimmy Jib Cranes & Gimbal Stabilizers, LED Video Walls & Green Screens, live and premium broadcast equipment, software are provided to students at FTII.

Beyond academics, FTII provides a vibrant campus life with student hostels, a gym, a swimming pool, and its own community radio station, Radio FTII. Surrounded by hills and lush greenery, the campus offers the perfect environment for aspiring filmmakers.

Recently, Shri Ashwini Vaishnaw inaugurated FTII's Cinema Theatre cum Auditorium, equipped with all modern features. The 586-seat auditorium at FTII is equipped with modern features like a cinema projector, PA system, and Dolby Atmos surround sound. Its standout feature is a 50x20 ft horizontally movable screen, adjustable by remote control,

transforming the space into a cinema theatre. This first-of-its-kind innovation enhances flexibility, and FTII has filed a patent for it.

Innovations and Outreach

To celebrate its Diamond Jubilee in 2021, FTII introduced 'Nabh Abhishek', a 21-foot-high metal art installation made from scrap studio lights, arclights, and tracks—essentially waste material turned into modern art.

In 2020, FTII established the Vijay Tendulkar Writers' Academy to promote screenwriting education. To expand film training opportunities, it launched the Skilling India in Film and Television (SKIFT) program in 2017. By March 2021, FTII had conducted 250 short courses in 43 cities, benefiting over 9,000 students, with its online courses also gaining popularity. These courses are taught in 4 different cottages named after famous female writers—Ismat Chugtai, Krishna Sobti, Amrita Pritam, and Durga Bhagwat.

Due to COVID-19, FTII temporarily shifted its operations but has since made a strong recovery. As of now, it has covered 450 short courses and 45 topics across 75 cities, benefiting over 16,000 students.

FTII Student Achievements

FTII student Chidananda S. Naik won the La Cinef Award at Cannes 2024 and the Best First-Time Filmmaker Award at the Greece International Film Festival for his film "Sunflowers Were the First Ones to Know." The film qualified for the 2024 Oscars and will compete in the 2025 Oscars in the Live Action Short Film category.

FTII student Payal Kapadia, known for her film All We Imagine as Light, won the Grand Prix at the 2024 Cannes Film Festival and became the first Indian filmmaker to win the Grand Prix award.

FTII and its Alumni

FTII has nurtured some of the most celebrated filmmakers, actors, and technicians in the industry. Its alumni include legendary figures like Rajkumar Hirani, Shabana Azmi, Naseeruddin Shah, Om Puri, Jaya Bachchan, Anurag Kashyap, Sanjay Leela Bhansali, Subhash Ghai, and many more. These artists have not only shaped Indian cinema but also made their mark internationally. FTII continues to be a hub of creativity, producing storytellers who are redefining the future of film and television.

Global Collaborations and Future Vision

FTII is a full member of CILECT, an international association of 180 audiovisual institutes across 65 countries. FTII maintains exchange with programs renowned institutions like La Fémis and Griffith Film School. With a commitment to preserving its rich legacy while embracing contemporary cinematic advancements, FTII continues to shape the future of Indian and global cinema. FTII has a strong history and continues to grow with time. It encourages learning through creative courses and filmmaking. Over the years, FTII has strengthened its presence, reflecting social, economic, and cultural changes in the films created by its students.



पुण्यातील भारत इतिहास संशोधक मंडळ (BISM) हे भारतीय इतिहासाचे संशोधन आणि जतन करणारे प्रमुख केंद्र आहे. येथे ऐतिहासिक कागदपत्रे, हस्तलिखिते, चित्रे आणि नाण्यांचा मोठा संग्रह आहे.

प्याच्या 'भरत नाट्य मंदिरा'शेजारी असणारी 'भारत इतिहास संशोधक मंडळा'ची वास्तू म्हणजे पुण्याचा मानबिंदू व भारताच्या व विशेषतः मराठेशाहीच्या इतिहासाचे संशोधन करणारी भारतातील एक अग्रगण्य स्वायत्त संस्था. तिची स्थापना ७ जुलै १९१० इतिहासाचार्य वि. का. राजवाडे आणि खं. चिं. मेहंदळे यांनी केली. या इमारतीत संग्रहालये आणि चित्रशाळा आहेत. यामध्ये राजमाता जिजाऊंपासून पेशव्यांपर्यंत अनेक दुर्मीळ कागदपत्रे, चित्रे, पुस्तके, पोथ्या, वस्तू यांचा संग्रह आहे. पुण्याचे वैभव असलेली ही वास्तू आहे

कागदपत्रे नसतील तर इतिहास हा ग्राह्य धरला जात नाही आणि आज 'भारत इतिहास संशोधक मंडळ' हा एकमेव स्रोत आहे म्हणजे इतिहासाचा अभ्यास करणाऱ्या विद्यार्थ्यांना 'भारत इतिहास संशोधक मंडळा'त यावं लागत. इतकी दुर्मीळ कागदपत्रे या संशोधक मंडळात आहेत.

भारताच्या सर्वांगीण इतिहास संशोधनासाठी

आवश्यक ती ऐतिहासिक साधने संगृहीत करून त्यांचे शास्त्रशुद्ध जतन व प्रदर्शन करणे आणि त्यासाठी आवश्यक अशा इमारती बांधणे, ही संस्थेची सुरुवातीची उद्दिष्टे होती. पुढे ही साधने आणि भारतीय इतिहास व संस्कृती यांविषयीचे संशोधनात्मक ग्रंथ प्रसिद्ध करण्याचे कामही संस्थेने अंगीकारले. संस्थेच्या घटनेनुसार मंडळाचा प्रमुख अध्यक्ष असून प्रशासकीय व्यवहार चिटणिसांमार्फत केला जातो. मंडळाचे वार्षिक व आजीव असे एकूण ५५० सभासद होते (१९८२). तेरा सभासदांचे कारभारी मंडळ दर तीन वर्षांनी निवडतात. त्यातून चिटणिसांची निवड होते. विद्यमान तीन चिटणीस असून कार्याध्यक्ष व खजिनदार हे सर्व सभासदांनी प्रत्यक्ष निवडून द्यावयाचे असतात. अध्यक्ष व उपाध्यक्ष यांची निवड दर तीन वर्षांनी सर्वसाधारण सभेत होते. सभासदांना ग्रंथालय, पोथीशाळा, दप्तरखाना इ. विभागांत संशोधन करण्याची सुविधा आहे. मंडळ दर तीन महिन्यांनी ऐतिहासिक निबंध, वृत्ते वगैरे सामग्रीसाठी एक मासिक प्रसिद्ध करते. तेही सभासदांना विनामूल्य मिळते.

मंडळातील अस्सल साधनांची चार भागांत व दालनांत विभागणी केली आहे :

- (अ) लेख्यशाळा : यात मोडी पत्रव्यवहार, कागदपत्रे, हिशोब वह्या, फार्सी कागदपत्रे, महजर, करीने, सनदा असे भिन्न भाषांतील मिळून सोळा लाख कागद मंडळात आहेत. यात आदिलशाही, शिवकाल, पेशवाई इत्यादींतील जवळपास पन्नास घराण्यांचे कागद आहेत.
- (आ) पोथीशाळा: यातील तेहतीस हजार हस्तलिखित ग्रंथांपैकी सतरा हजारांची सूची प्रसिद्ध झाली आहे. हे ग्रंथ संस्कृत, मराठी, फार्सी, कन्नड इ. भाषांतील असून त्यांपैकी दोनशे पोथ्या सचित्र आहेत त्या धार्मिक, ज्योतिषविषयक व काव्यांच्या आहेत. त्यांची स्वतंत्र सूची तयार करण्याचे काम चालू आहे. सचित्र पोथ्यांपैकी गीतापश्चरत्नी, शकुनवंती, सिंहासनबत्तीशी (संस्कृत) व तारीख-इ-हुसेनशाही (फार्सी) ह्या उल्लेखनीय असून फार्सी सचित्र प्रत ही जगातील दुर्मीळ ग्रंथांपैकी एक आहे.
- (इ) चित्रशाळा : यात एकूण बाराशे दुर्मीळ लघुचित्रे आहेत. भिन्न भिन्न काळातील ही चित्रे विभिन्न शैलीतील आहेत. त्यांत रागरागिणी, बारामास, व्यक्तिचित्रणे, परंपरागत सजावटी यांची चित्रणे असून त्यांतील तालचित्रे उल्लेखनीय आहेत. या विषयावर अन्यत्र असा संग्रह नाही. याशिवाय अकबर, जहांगीर यांची व्यक्तिचित्रणे तसेच मराठेशाहीतील पहिला बाजीराव, नानासाहेब, रघुनाथराव, थोरला माधवराव, सवाई माधवराव, नाना फडणीस, महादजी शिंदे, हरिपंत फडके यांची अस्सल चित्रेही आहेत. शिवाय पाऊणशेच्यावर काचचित्रे आहेत.
- (ई) नाणी: सोने, चांदी, तांबे इ. धातूंची सुमारे सात हजार नाणी मंडळाच्या संग्रही असून ती कालदृष्ट्या सातवाहन काळापासून अठराव्या शतकापर्यंतच्या कालखंडातील निरनिराळ्या राजधराण्यांची आहेत.
- (3) ताम्रपट: चालुक्य, राष्ट्रकूट व यादव या वंशांचे एकूण ३० ताम्रपट, तसेच अनेक मूर्ती, वीरगळ, शस्त्रे, वस्त्रे, नकाशे अशा विविध वस्तू या विभागात आहेत.
- (क) प्रयोगशाळा: आधुनिक उपकरणांनी सुसज्ज असून त्यात कागदपत्रांच्या रक्षणासाठी त्यांवर पारदर्शक कागदाचा थर देऊन ती टिकाऊ करण्यासाठी लॅमिनेशन करणे, नाणी

व इतर वस्तू स्वच्छ करणे इ. कामे चालतात.

- (ए) संशोधन विभाग: कागदपत्रांचे संपादन, नाण्यांचे व ताम्रपटांचे वाचन इ. वृत्तांत प्रसंगोपात्त प्रसिद्ध झालेले आहेत. पुरातत्त्व संशोधनाच्या दृष्टीने १९४९ मध्ये कराड येथे मंडळाने उत्खनन केले. त्यानंतर १९८०पासून दौलताबादच्या मध्ययुगीन संस्कृतीचे संशोधन करण्याच्या व उत्खननाच्या प्रकल्पात डेक्कन कॉलेज (पुणे) व मराठवाडा विद्यापीठ (औरंगाबाद) यांच्याबरोबर मंडळाने भाग घेतला आहे.
- (ऐ) ग्रंथालय: मंडळात संशोधकांना उपयुक्त असे अठरा हजार दुर्मीळ ग्रंथ असून प्रतिवर्षी त्यांत नवीन पुस्तकांची भर पडते. शिवाय पंचेचाळीस नियतकालिके मंडळात नियमित येतात. ग्रंथालयाला जोडूनच संशोधकांसाठी अभ्यासिकाही आहेत.

मंडळाने इतिहासतज्ज्ञांचे अनेक संशोधनपर ग्रंथ प्रकाशित केले आहेत. त्यांत प्रामुख्याने मंडळाने जमिवलेल्या अस्सल साधनांचे प्रकाशन आहे. स्वीय मालेतील एकशे पंधरा प्रकाशने असून त्यांपैकी (१) मराठ्यांच्या इतिहासाची साधने, खंड १ ते १२ (राजवाडे, वि. का.), (२) ऐतिहासिक फार्सी साहित्य, खंड १ ते ६ (खरे, ग. ह. कुलकर्णी, गो. त्र्यं.), (३) दक्षिणच्या मध्ययुगीन इतिहासाची साधने, खंड १ ते ४ (खरे, ग. ह.), (४) फार्सी मराठी कोश (पटवर्धन, मा. त्रिं.), (५) पुणे नगर संशोधन वृत्त, खंड १ ते ४, (६) महाराष्ट्रातील काही प्राचीन ताम्रपट व शिलालेख (दीक्षित, मो. गं.), (७) ताल पेंटिंग्ज (रानडे, उषा चव्हाण, कमल), (८) भागवत पुराण पेंटिंग्ज (माटे, म. श्री. रानडे, उषा) इ. प्रमुख ग्रंथ होत. याशिवाय मंडळाने पुरस्कृत केलेले अनेक ग्रंथ आहेत.

प्रतिवर्षी मे महिन्याच्या शेवटच्या आठवड्यात मंडळाचे वार्षिक सम्मेलन भरते. तसेच मंडळाचा

वाढिदवस, पाक्षिक सभा इ. प्रसंगी मंडळाचे सभासद, अभ्यासू व्यक्ती एकत्र येऊन शोधिनबंधाचे वाचन व चर्चा होते. इचलकरंजीकर स्मृतिदिन व्याख्यानमाला, शिवचिरत्रावरील व्याख्यानमाला, करवीर व्याख्यानमाला इ. व्याख्यान-सत्रे ही ज्ञानप्रसाराची मंडळाची मुख्य साधने होत. रामदास निर्वाण त्रिशताब्दी चर्चासत्र, नाणकशास्त्र परिषद, महाराष्ट्र इतिहास परिषद



अशी विशेष चर्चासत्रे विशेष प्रसंगी मंडळात होतात. मंडळाने म. मो. दत्तो वामन पोतदार यांच्या स्मरणार्थ 'पोतदार प्रतिष्ठान' स्थापले असून त्याद्वारे मध्ययुगीन इतिहासाच्या अभ्यासाचे वर्ग चालवले जातात. त्याचप्रमाणे मोडी फार्सीचेही वर्ग चालतात.

सभासद वर्गणी, शासकीय व निमशासकीय अनुदाने, व्यक्तिगत आणि सार्वजनिक देणग्या यांवर मंडळाची आर्थिक भिस्त असून मंडळाच्या इमारतीसाठी व ग्रंथालयासाठी देणग्या मिळाल्या. त्यांतील १९२९ मधील डॉ. जस्टिन बट यांची ३० हजार डॉलर्सची देणगी विशेष उल्लेखनीय होती. त्यानंतर जुन्या इमारतीशेजारी नवी इमारत बांधण्यासाठी महाराष्ट्र शासन व भारत सरकार यांनी सु. तीन लाखांचे अनुदान दिले. तसेच मराठ्यांचा इतिहासाच्या स्वतंत्र दालनासाठी पुणे महानगरपालिकेने २५,००० रुपयांचे अनुदान दिले. याशिवाय मंडळाचे एक माजी कार्यकर्ते रा. वि. ओतूरकर यांनी विडलांच्या स्मरणार्थ २५,००० रुपये दिले. त्यातून त्रैमासिक आणि ग्रंथालयाच्या व्यवस्थापनाचा खर्च केला जातो. याशिवाय छोट्या -मोठ्या अनेक देणग्या मंडळाला मिळाल्या व मिळतात.

अनेक ऐतिहासिक नाणी, वस्तू व कागदपत्रे मंडळाला संशोधकांनी दिली. मंडळाच्या प्रकाशनासाठी भारत सरकार व महाराष्ट्र शासन प्रतिवर्षी काही अनुदान देते.

इतिहासाच्या पाऊलखुणा या वस्तूने जपल्यात याच वस्तूचा कायापालट आणि जीणींद्धार होत आहे आणि नवीन वस्तू लवकरात दाखल होत आहे. साध्य मूळ वस्तूला धक्का न लावता नृतनीकरण पूर्ण झाले आहे यामध्ये आधुनिक सुविधांनी सध्याची ऐतिहासिक वास्तू वि.का. राजवाडे सभागृह परिषद परिसंवाद व्याख्या त्यांनी संस्कृत कार्यक्रम उपयुक्त आहे. त्याबरोबरच ना जोशी कक्ष गृह, खरे कक्ष, खंडेराव मेहेंदळे कक्ष, बाळासाहेब पुरंदरे कक्ष हे कक्ष कार्यक्रमासाठी उपलब्ध आहेत. एक शतकाहून आधी काळ इतिहासाचे मूलभूत संशोधन व ऐतिहासिक साधनांचे संवर्धन करणारी संस्था आहे. यामध्ये संग्रहालय, ग्रंथालय ,संशोधक सुविधा ,भेटवस्तू विक्री केंद्र आणि समृद्ध संग्रहालय आहेत. खरं म्हणलं तर पुणे शहरातील नाही तर संपूर्ण देशात वैभव असलेली ही वास्तू आहे.


पुणेरी पगडी आणि पुणेरी जोडे

पुणेरी पगडी आणि पुणेरी जोडे या एकेकाळी पुण्यातल्या दोन प्रसिद्ध गोष्टी. एक डोक्यावर घालायची आणि दुसरी पायात. दोन्हींचाही रंग लालभडक. डोक्यावर लाल ऐटबाज पगडी ठेवून आणि पायात सुबक रंगीत जोडा घालून, हातात मोतियाचा गजरा खेळवीत एखादा होशी पुणेकर बुधवार चौकातून बेलबागेच्या रोखानं चुटू चुटू जाऊ लागला म्हणजे ते बघण्यासारखे दृश्य असे. प्रौढ वयाचे पुण्यातील बहुतेक ब्राह्मण त्यावेळी पगड्याच घालीत. पुणेरी जोड्यांचे मात्र एक वैशिष्ट्य असे. तो कोरा असेपर्यंत त्याची खरी शोभा आणि दिवाणखान्यात नेण्याची त्याची लायकी. पण एकदा का तो जुना झाला की त्याचे स्थान एकदम शौचकुपाच्या दाराशी. पावसाळ्याच्या दिवसात पुणेरी जोडे घालणाऱ्या पुणेकरांची मात्र खुपच फजिती उडत असे. चालताना त्यांच्या टाचेखालचा चिखल मागे कोटावर उडू लागे आणि थोड्याच वेळात कोटाच्या पाठीवर उभे गंध लावल्यासारख्या चिखलाच्या दोन



जाड रेषा उमटलेल्या दिसत. वहाणा आणि चपला येऊ लागल्यापासून मात्र पुणेरी जोडा हलके हलके नाहीसा होऊ लागला.

When the spirituality of nature and the beauty of devotion makes a blend of historical preservator, that's how The Sarasbhaug Ganesh Temple showcasing itself to the visitors.

The Sarasbaug Ganesh Temple (Shri Siddhivinayak Temple), also known as Talyatla Ganpati, is one of the famous temples in Pune, Maharashtra. It is one of the oldest temples dedicated to Lord Ganesha and is located within the picturesque Sarasbaug garden.

On one side stood a small hillock, almost like an island, atop which was a temple dedicated Shri small Siddhivinayak. The entire area was desolate, and people referred to it as Talyatla Ganpati (Ganpati of the Lake). Even then, some wondered why it was called Talyatla (of the lake). But most Punekars knew that this place was once a vast lake. A beautiful garden was created on this island, and Shrimant Nanasaheb Peshwa gave it a poetic name — The Sarasbaug.

Sarasbaug is a popular landmark in

Pune, known for its beautiful garden, making it a peaceful and spiritual destination for devotees and tourists alike. The area where Sarasbaug stands was initially a lake near Parvati Hill. Over time, the water dried up, and the land was converted into a garden, with the temple remaining as its centerpiece.

The Sarasbaug Mandir, during the reign of Nanasaheb Peshwa, was part of an ambitious project. The work of creating an artificial lake at the foot of Parvati Hill started in 1750 on the border of the Ambil stream. Shrimant Nanasaheb Peshwa, a prominent leader of the Peshwa dynasty, was the true architect of Pune. Many of the major developments that contributed to Pune's prosperity were conceptualized by him. His foresight remains evident even today.

In 1750, he devised a bold yet



ambitious plan, which included several urgent projects to enhance the city. He built the temple, which was historically significant, and the work on the lake started from 1750 to 1753. The lake was intentionally excavated to serve as a significant water reservoir. This depression was not natural. Between 1753 and 1755, Shrimant Nanasaheb Peshwa had the lake dug, covering approximately twenty-five acres. While excavating the pond, a foot island was created and reserved for the temple and garden. The lake was used for boating, after which a beautiful garden was created on the island.

The temple atop Parvati Hill, the construction of a grand reservoir at its base to provide Pune with a permanent water supply, the foresight to divert the Ambil stream away from the town to prevent future problems, the creation of a second large reservoir near Katraj, and the supply of water to Pune through stone-built pipelines with public water tanks at various locations — these were all part of a comprehensive plan. Additionally, at the foot of Parvati Hill, a walled enclosure

named Ramana was constructed for distributing alms during the month of Shravan, and a fortified wall was built around Shaniwar Wada for added security.

Between October 1753 and March 1755, in just 17 months, the construction of the reservoir was completed — a fact that seems astonishing even today. Moreover, the total cost of the project was ₹,99,553, an amount that is almost unbelievable by today's standards. If we were to assess its value in modern terms, it would amount to several crores.

Nana Saheb Peshwa successfully completed this ambitious project between 1750 and 1759. Today, this feat might seem almost impossible and astonishing. Although he officially took charge of administration at the age of twenty, Nana Saheb had already begun playing an active role in Pune's governance. At the time, Pune needed systematic and well-planned growth, and he worked tirelessly to achieve this. Thanks to his efforts, Pune had already gained the status of a prosperous city nearly two centuries ago.

In 1784, Shrimant Sawai Madhavrao Peshwa built a small temple on the island of the lake and established the adorable idol of Shree Siddhivinayak Gajanan, the God he worshiped. Naturally, Sarasbaug, Parvati, and the lake have now become places of pilgrimage and darshan for Punekars. The temple was historically used as a secret meeting place by the Peshwas during the Maratha rule to discuss military strategies.

During British rule, the garden was maintained as a public space, and it continued to be an important place of worship. Over the centuries, the temple has become a center of faith and devotion for thousands of devotees.

The exquisite marble idol of Lord Ganesh, with a right-turned trunk, became known as Siddhivinayak. The idol has been changed twice, in 1882 and 1990. The temple and the surrounding area have been renovated several times over the years. The original idol was made of kurund stone.

Now, the entire mandir is managed by Mr. M.D. Kulkarni. Elderly visitors, especially, are reluctant to climb down the 25-30 steps leading to the garden, as there is no provision for them. While the Municipal Corporation could easily install one or two elevators, they are instead considering building an elevated walkway from the entrance to the temple. However, even with this, visitors will still have to descend stairs to reach the garden. It is surprising that city officials are unaware of how this so-called facility will alienate the elderly from the garden.

For the last 30-40 years, the residents of Pune have celebrated festivals like Ganesh Chaturthi at Sarasbaug Mandir with grand aartis, bhajans, processions. Thousands of devotees visit to seek Lord Ganesha's blessings. During Diwali (Lakshmi Pujan & Deepotsav), the temple is beautifully decorated with lamps and flowers. Rangoli is beautifully crafted, and people start coming to the temple at 5 in the morning to begin their year with the blessings of Lord Ganesha and Lakshmi prayers for prosperity.


The Sarasbaug Ganpati Temple complex also houses the Shree Ganesh

Darshan Museum, inaugurated on April 28, 1996. This museum features a beautiful collection of Lord Ganesha idols crafted from various materials, including precious stones, wood, brass, copper, ceramic, porcelain, seashells, coconuts, and ivory.

The mandir also houses paintings depicting Sarasbaug Temple, including portraits of Nanasaheb Peshwa and murals of Sawai Madhavrao Peshwa and Mahadji Shinde at Sarasbaug Lake. Located behind the main Ganpati temple within the Sarasbaug complex, the museum is open to the public for a nominal entry fee of ₹0. Visitors can explore this unique collection to gain insight into the rich cultural and artistic heritage associated with Lord Ganesha.

Sarasbaug is Pune's beloved spot. The Sarasbaug Chowpatty, just outside the garden, has numerous food stalls, offering some of the most delicious street food in Pune. People often visit Sarasbaug Mandir and enjoy food at Chowpatty.

The garden follows its own unwritten social norm. Senior citizens and youth visit for walking and exercising in the morning (6 to 10 AM). The crowd starts gathering around 5 PM. By 7-7:30 PM, people of all ages are present. However, no matter the purpose of their visit, everyone ensures they seek Ganpati darshan before leaving.



Chaturshringi mandir is not just a temple but a spiritual and cultural epicenter for the people of Pune. It stands as a beacon of faith, history and divine power.

Indian goddesses have always played a sacred and influential role in Indian culture and heritage. Among them, Pune is home to Goddess Chaturshrungi, who is visited by countless devotees for their faith and trust in her divine energy. Nestled amidst four towering mountains, the revered Chaturshrungi Mandir stands as a beacon of faith, history, and divine power. With a rich legacy spanning over 250 years, this temple has been managed by the Anagal family and continues to be a significant center of spiritual worship and cultural heritage.

Historical Significance

The temple traces its origins to the

Peshwa when Durlabhsheth era. **Pitambardas** Mahajan, devout moneylender and follower of Goddess Saptashrungi from Nashik, prayed for a way to continue his worship despite his old age. According to legend, the goddess appeared to him in a vision and guided him to a location in the northwest of Pune, where he would find her divine presence. Upon digging, he discovered a Swayambhu (self-manifested) idol of the goddess and established the temple at that very spot. To mark and honor this miraculous event, Durlabhsheth minted a Chaturshrungi Rupee during the Peshwa reign.

The temple's sacred journey took a

formal turn in 1958 with the Anagal Settlement Deal, where 12 acres of land were acquired by the Anagal family, solidifying their enduring association with the temple. Later, in 1979, it was officially declared a Public Trust, ensuring its continued management and preservation. Today, the Anagal family has upheld its religious traditions for five generations.

Management and Structure

The temple is currently managed by 11 trustees from the Anagal family. Key figures in the temple's administration include AmitAnagal, who serves as Chairman and President; Shrikanth Anagal, the Managing Trustee; and Suhas Prabhakar Anagal, another trustee, among others. Their efforts have played a crucial role in maintaining the temple's spiritual and infrastructural sanctity.

A year-long renovation project is nearing completion, which will further enhance the temple's grandeur. The temple complex will soon be divided into three distinct sections: Poojari Niwas (a residential facility for temple priests), DhyaanKaksh (a meditative space for spiritual contemplation), and Garbhagriha (the main sanctum housing the divine idol of Goddess Chaturshrungi).

Spiritual Importance and Unique Features

Goddess Chaturshrungi is regarded as the reigning deity of Pune. She is also considered an ArdhShaktiPeeth, as she is believed to be the sister of Goddess Saptashrungi of Nashik. The temple, located on the slopes of a mountain in the northwest of Pune, is surrounded by breathtaking natural beauty. Spanning 90 feet in height and 125 feet in width, it has remained a significant pilgrimage site for centuries.

A unique aspect of Chaturshrungi Mandir is the presence of a Ganesh temple, built in 1980 by the trustees. Traditionally, temples dedicated to Goddess Shakti do not include a Ganesh temple, making this one an exception.

The deity, Goddess Chaturshrungi, is depicted with four hands, each holding a shankh (conch), chakra (discus), gada (mace), and astra (weapon), symbolizing her divine power. She is also known as Mankarnika, the fulfiller of wishes. Devotees perform Navasphedna (a ritual offering) when their prayers are answered.

Festivals and Celebrations

The temple's grandest celebration is the NavratriMela, a ten-day extravaganza that attracts nearly 10 lakh devotees. The festivities begin on Day 1 with the GhatSthapana ritual and end on Day 10 with the PalkiYatra, during which the idol of Devi Chaturshrungi is brought down among the masses.

On Dussehra, a silver idol of the goddess is carried in a grand procession from the Chaturshrungi temple to Pune University. The day is marked by unique traditions, such as offering Apteka Paan, preparing the sacred PanchPakwan Bhog, and a spectacular PushpVrushti (flower shower) from a helicopter. The silver chariot procession on Vijaya Dashami (Dussehra) remains one of the festival's biggest highlights.

Cultural and Community Involvement Beyond its religious significance, the



temple fosters cultural and spiritual enrichment. The Ravi Shankar Sanskritik Bhavan provides a dedicated space for meditation and cultural events. Additionally, a Hasya Club hosts laughter therapy sessions every morning from 6:30 to 7:30 AM, promoting mental well-being among devotees.

Development and Master Plan

Recognizing the need for modernization and better facilities for devotees, the Chaturshrungi Mandir Trust has initiated a comprehensive development plan called Jirnodhar. A renowned architect from Pune has designed a Master Plan to reconstruct a grander and more accessible temple.

The new temple complex will include a Nagarkhana (a musical gateway), a waterfall and scenic fountains, drinking water tanks, improved facilities, dharmashalas for pilgrims' stay, and trustee office and security personnel quarters. The natural beauty of the hill has been enhanced with gardens, statues, and shaded rest areas. The uphill climb to the

temple has been made easier with well-planned steps and resting spots. Drinking water is provided at multiple locations, ensuring comfort for devotees. Special arrangements for Sulabh Darshan (easy viewing of the deity) have been made, especially during Navratri.

While Tuesdays and Fridays witness regular devotees, weekends especially Saturdays and Sundays—see an influx of

professionals from the IT sector and working-class communities, seeking solace and blessings from the divine.

bode to the legacy of Ramkrishna Gopal Bhandarkar, nestled in the heart of Pune, the Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute (BORI) stands as a beacon of wisdom and enlightenment, lighting the path to the hidden treasures of South Asia's intellectual and cultural heritage. Established on July 6, 1917, BORI was conceived to honour the legacy of Ramkrishna Gopal Bhandarkar, a towering figure in the world of scientific Orientology in India. Bhandarkar's vision was to bring the ancient knowledge of the East into the light of modern scholarship, unravel the mysteries and offer a window into the philosophical and cultural complexities that have shaped the very soul of India. Today, BORI continues this noble endeavour, standing as a living testament to India's rich tradition of

knowledge, spirituality, and intellectual rigour.

The term "oriental research" might sound unfamiliar to many, in the context of BORI, it refers to the systematic study of the languages, literature, religions, cultures, and philosophies of the East particularly those of South Asia. It is an exploration that goes beyond mere academics and delves deep into the essence of thought and tradition. As the ancient scriptures say, true knowledge not only transcends the intellect but it also touches the heart and soul. BORI's work, therefore, is not just about preserving ancient manuscripts but about keeping alive the very spirit of India's intellectual tradition, one that has always emphasized the purity and sanctity of knowledge, as seen in the words of the Upanishads: "नहि

ज्ञानेनसदृशंपवित्रमिहविद्यते" (There is no purer knowledge than the knowledge of the Self).

One of the institute's crowning jewels is the Dr R.N. Dandekar Library, which houses over 125,000 volumes, many, rare and invaluable. This vast treasure trove of knowledge serves as a resource for scholars worldwide, providing access to the intellectual treasures that India has safeguarded for millennia. The library is a standing monument to the enduring relevance of ancient knowledge in the modern world, embodying the words of the great sage, Swami Vivekananda, who once said, "The world is the great gymnasium where we come to make ourselves strong."

But BORI's work is far from finished. Like the great tree whose roots stretch deep into the soil of time, BORI's branches continue to grow, expanding into new areas of research and exploration.

One of the most exciting initiatives

currently in progress is the PrakritBhasha Project; an important initiative to compile a comprehensive dictionary of Prakrit words. Prakrit languages, which include Ardhamagadhi, Jain Maharashtri.



Shauraseni, Maharashtri, Shauraseni, Magadhi, and Apabhramsha, were widely used in ancient India, particularly in Jainism, Buddhism, and other religious and philosophical texts.

The project focuses on collecting Prakrit words from a wide array of ancient manuscripts, inscriptions, and texts that have not been thoroughly studied. Scholars at BORI are meticulously documenting these words and their meanings, offering a detailed lexicon that will serve as a crucial resource for future research in ancient Indian languages and culture.

This dictionary will help preserve the linguistic richness of the Prakrits, shedding light on their historical significance and their influence on later languages. By doing so, the PrakritBhasha Project plays a vital role in understanding the intellectual and cultural landscape of ancient India.

The PrakritBhasha Project, in many ways, embodies the spirit of inclusivity found in the ancient Vedic mantra, "आनोभद्राःक्रतवोयन्तुविश्वतः" (Let noble thoughts come to us from all directions). Just as the river Ganga welcomes every drop that flows into it, BORI's approach to research embraces wisdom from all corners of the world, integrating diverse traditions and insights. Project not only preserves rare texts in Prakrit but also facilitates international collaboration, enriching our collective understanding of the cultural and philosophical heritage of ancient India.

BORI's ongoing efforts to digitize its manuscript collection are another key area of focus. This project, like a modern-day Dharma Yudhha (righteous battle), aims to ensure that the invaluable manuscripts preserved in the institute's vaults are made available to scholars across the globe. By digitizing these texts, BORI ensures that the treasures of India's intellectual heritage will continue to inspire future generations, no matter where they are. In today's digital age, where information can travel faster than the wind, BORI is ensuring that India's knowledge is never confined to the past but is shared with a global community of seekers.

Beyond the Mahabharata Project and Prakrit research, BORI collaborates with international institutions, bringing India's intellectual tradition to the global stage. Through conferences, workshops, and joint research projects, BORI continues to foster scholarly exchange, contributing to the growing field of Indology. Like the Saptarishi (Seven Sages) whose wisdom illuminates the night sky, BORI's work casts a radiant light on India's ancient knowledge, inspiring scholars and thinkers across the globe to embark on their journeys of discovery.

Operational Details

All international flight operations have been shifted to Terminal 2 as of December 24, 2024. This is done to simplify processes and ensure a hassle-free travel experience for international travellers.

As of December 2024, Pune International Airport's Terminal 2 (T2) has become fully operational, handling all international flight operations. The airport has experienced a significant increase in daily flight movements, reaching a record high of 204 in a single day.

While T2 is dedicated to international flights, the exact number of daily flights operating from this terminal can vary based on airline schedules and seasonal demand. Currently, five international flights on three routes are operating from the Pune airport, all of which have been shifted to the new terminal.

IndiGo: Operates services to Pune to Dubai and Bangkok.

SpiceJet: Flight services to Dubai.


Air India (formerly Vistara): Offers services to Singapore.

City Church, with its rich history and contributions to the local community, remains a testament to the bond between the Maratha Empire and the Portuguese, making it not just a religious centre but a historical landmark in Pune's heritage.

Pune's Historic Gem: The legacy of Our Lady of Immaculate Conception Church, affectionately known as City Church, stands as a testament to Pune's multicultural heritage. Established in 1792, it is the oldest Catholic church in the city and a living chronicle of the alliance between the Maratha Peshwas and Portuguese soldiers. The church is located at Quarter Gate, 433 Nana Peth, Pune 411002, and is over 229 years old.

Why "City Church"?

The name derives from its location at Quarter Gate, once the entry point to Pune. Its multicultural ethos is reflected in multilingual Masses (English, Konkani, Marathi), serving a diverse congregation.

The church's origins trace back to the late 18th century when Peshwa Madhavrao II sought to strengthen his army's artillery prowess. Recognizing the expertise of

Portuguese and Goan Catholic soldiers, he enlisted them into his forces. By 1788, nearly 300 such soldiers served under the Peshwa. Around 1790, Dom Manuel Noronha, a Portuguese officer in the Peshwa army, requested the Archbishop of Goa to send Father Vincent Joaquim Menezes to minister to the Catholic soldiers. Madhavrao II donated land in 1792 to build a place of worship for these soldiers, marking the birth of Pune's Catholic community. The inaugural Mass was held on December 8, 1792, and a modest brick-and-mortar structure was completed by 1794.

Originally a simple mud-and-mortar building, the church underwent significant transformations. During British rule in the 1840s, land grants and funding led to renovations, though the Portuguese-style front facade retained its original character. In 1852, a new stone structure was

completed, replacing the original building.

Cultural and Social Contributions

The church is not only a place of worship but also a hub for various cultural, social, and educational activities. It has been instrumental in establishing a strong Christian community in Pune. Key contributions include:

- 1. An elementary school was started by City Church in 1833 on its premises. The Archbishop Don Ares de Ornellas de Vasconcellos had more classrooms built, thus converting the primary school into a high school in 1887. The school was named after him and is known as Ornellas High School.
- 2. Since 1961, City Church has been running Ishaprema Niketan, a community service centre where orphans and destitute unemployed women are given shelter, and efforts are made for their upliftment.
- 3. Since 1993, a free medical centre has been run with the help of expert doctors on the first and third Sunday of every month.
- 4. Food, clothing, books, financial assistance, educational support, and health care are provided to the needy by the St. Vincent de Paul Institute of the church.
- City Church runs hostels for women and men. Needy women and men coming from out of town for work and education are provided accommodation here at nominal fees.

The church remains a spiritual hub, celebrating festivals like Easter, Christmas, and All Saints' Day with fervour. December 8, its Foundation Day, holds special pride.

During the 2017 anniversary, descendants of the Peshwa lineage—Vinayakrao and Mahendra Peshwe were honoured with traditional Puneripagdis, symbolizing gratitude for their ancestors' patronage.

Heritage Designation and Renovations

Designated a Grade II heritage site by the Pune Municipal Corporation, the church balances modernity with history. While interiors have evolved, the facade remains a nod to its Portuguese roots.

Before its 225th anniversary on December 8, 2017, all 15 of the church's 9-foot-high windows with Gothic details were changed from transparent to colourful stained glass, depicting various stories of the life of Jesus Christ. The erection of a marble cornerstone enlisting all the priests of the congregation to date was also commenced.

From its martial origins to its role as a social beacon, it embodies Pune's spirit of inclusivity. As parishioner Savion Ambrose remarked, "The church binds generations together." आळंदी हे पुणे जिल्ह्यातील एक पवित्र तीर्थक्षेत्र आहे, जे इंद्रायणी नदीच्या काठावर वसलेले आहे. हे ठिकाण संत ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराजांच्या समाधीमुळे संपूर्ण महाराष्ट्रातील भक्तांसाठी अत्यंत महत्त्वाचे आहे. येथे येणाऱ्या भाविकांना एक वेगळ्याच भक्तिमय वातावरणाचा अनुभव येतो.

त ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराज समाधी मंदिर संत ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराजांनी इथे १२९६ साली संजीवन समाधी घेतली. त्यांची समाधी असलेले मंदिर वारकरी संप्रदायासाठी श्रद्धेचे प्रमुख केंद्र आहे. समाधीच्या भोवती असलेल्या सुंदर नगारखान्यासह मंदिराची वास्तुशैली अप्रतिम आहे.

मंदिराच्या मुख्य गाभाऱ्यात संत ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराजांची समाधी आहे, जिथे भाविक नतमस्तक होतात. संपूर्ण मंदिर संकुल वारकरी परंपरेचा वारसा जपते.

इंद्रायणी नदी आणि पवित्र घाट

आळंदीच्या पश्चिमेस इंद्रायणी नदी वाहते, जी पवित्र मानली जाते. येथे सुंदर घाट बांधलेले आहेत, जिथे भाविक स्नान करतात. विशेषतः वारीच्या काळात, येथे मोठी गर्दी पाहायला मिळते. इंद्रायणीच्या घाटावर भक्त मंडळी हरिपाठ गाताना दिसतात, जे अत्यंत भक्तिरसपूर्ण क्षण असतो.

वारी आणि पालखी सोहळा

आळंदी हे वारकरी संप्रदायाच्या वारी परंपरेतील एक महत्त्वाचे स्थान आहे. दरवर्षी आषाढी एकादशीच्या ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराजांची पालखी पंढरपुरकडे खाना होते. लाखो वारकरी टाळ-मुदंगाच्या गजरात 'ज्ञानोबा-तुकाराम' म्हणत चालत जातात.

हे दृश्य पाहण्यासाठी संपूर्ण महाराष्ट्रातील भक्तगण येथे हजेरी लावतात. वारी हा एक भक्तिरसाने ओथंबलेला सोहळा असून, तो महाराष्ट्राच्या संस्कृतीचा अनमोल ठेवा आहे.

आळंदीतील अन्य धार्मिक स्थळे

आळंदी हे पुणे जिल्ह्यातील इंद्रायणी नदीच्या काठावर वसलेले एक पवित्र तीर्थक्षेत्र आहे. संत ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराजांच्या समाधीमुळे या ठिकाणाला विशेष महत्त्व प्राप्त झाले आहे. येथे वारकरी संप्रदायाची परंपरा आणि भक्तीचा अनोखा अनुभव मिळतो.

आळंदीत संत ज्ञानेश्वरमहाराज समाधीशिवाय इतरही अनेक धार्मिक स्थळे आहेत, जसे की

- कृष्ण मंदिर हे मंदिर श्रीकृष्णाला समर्पित आहे आणि येथे वारकरी संप्रदायाचे प्रवचन व भजन होते.
- मुक्ताई मंदिर संत ज्ञानेश्वर महाराजांच्या मोठ्या भिगनी मुक्ताई यांचे मंदिर येथे आहे.



- राम मंदिर आणि विञ्चल-रखुमाई मंदिर भक्ती संप्रदायाचे महत्त्व दर्शवणारी ही मंदिरेही भाविकांसाठी अत्यंत पवित्र मानली जातात.
- स्वामी हरिहरेंद्र मठ येथे विविध आध्यात्मिक कार्यक्रम आयोजित केले जातात.

आळंदी यात्रेचा अनुभव

आळंदीला भेट देणे म्हणजे भक्ती, अध्यात्म आणि शांततेचा अनुभव घेणे. येथे येताना भाविक ज्ञानेश्वरी ग्रंथातील काही ओवींचा पाठ

करतात आणि समाधी मंदिरात जाऊन नतमस्तक होतात.

येथील वातावरण दिवसभर भक्तिरसाने भारलेले असते. टाळ-भजनांचा गजर, वारकरी संप्रदायाचे कीर्तन आणि भक्तिगीतांनी संपूर्ण परिसर भक्तिमय बनतो.

पुणे आणि आंतरभारती

पुण्याच्या चित्रपट कलावंतांमध्ये गिरीश कर्नाड यांचे कर्तृत्व विसरता येणार नाही. व्ही शांताराम यांची प्रभात चित्रपट कंपनी हे चित्रपटाच्या क्षेत्रात पुण्याला नावलौकिक मिळवून देणारी ठरली.



शांताराम वणकुद्रे हे मूळचे हुबळीचे. तसेच पुण्याच्या संगीत विश्वाला कर्नाटकची देणगी मिळाली आहे . पंडित भीमसेन जोशी, सवाई गंधर्व हे दोघेही आपण पुणेकर म्हणून ओळखत असलो तरी मूळचे कर्नाटकातले. शांता हुबळीकर , विमल कर्नाटकी, कृष्णा हनगल, गणपती भट, गीता जावडेकर, मल्लिकार्जुन मन्सूर , गंगुबाई हनगल अशी कितीतरी कर्नाटकी नावे पुण्याचे संगीत विश्व संपन्न करणारी आहेत.

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ऐतिहासिक वारसा असलेली पेशवे काळातील प्रसिद्ध पर्वती टेकडी ही पुणे शहराला लाभलेले एक प्रसिद्ध ठिकाण आहे. पेशव्यांचे श्रद्धास्थान असलेली ही टेकडी बघायला भारताच्या प्रत्येक भागातून लोक येत असतात.

सर्गांचं सुंदर वरदान लाभलेली आणि पेशवं काळातील प्रसिद्ध असणारी पर्वती टेकडी ही महाराष्ट्रातील पुणे शहराच्या आग्नेय दिशेस उभी असलेली टेकडी आहे. मराठा सत्तेचा ध्वज अटकेपार नेणाऱ्या पेशव्यांचे श्रद्धास्थान म्हणजे पुण्यातील पर्वती टेकडी पर्वती संस्थानला अडीचशे वर्षांची परंपरा आहे. पर्वताई देवीच्या नावावरूनच या टेकडीला पर्वती हे नाव पडले आहे. पुण्याच्या अनेक भागांतून पाहिलं तर ही टेकडी दिसून येते. जर पुणे शहरातील महत्त्वाच्या जागा विचारल्या तर पहिल्या पाचमध्ये प्रत्येक पुणेकर पर्वती टेकडीचं नाव घेतो. कारण सकाळी सकाळी व्यायामासाठी, सायंकाळी हवा खाण्यासाठी तसेच पर्यटन स्थळ म्हणूनदेखील अनेक लोक पर्वतीवर आवर्जून येतात.

पर्वती टेकडीवर देवदेवेश्वर मंदिर व अन्य काही देवदेवतांची मंदिरे आहेत. तसेच टेकडीवर नानासाहेब पेशव्यांचे स्मारक, पेशवे संग्रहालय, बाजीराव पेशव्यांचा घोड्यावर स्वार असलेला पुतळा तसेच पायथ्याला प्राचीन लेणीदेखील आहे.

पर्वती टेकडीवरील मंदिरे व त्यांचा इतिहास...

१७४९मध्ये नानासाहेब पेशव्यांनी पर्वतीवर अनेक मंदिरे बांधली. मराठा साम्राज्याचे पंतप्रधान असलेल्या नानासाहेब पेशवे यांनी तावरे पाटील यांच्याकडून जमीन घेऊन देवदेवेश्वर मंदिर बांधून घेतले. २३ एप्रिल १७४९ रोजी हे मंदिर बांधले.

थोरल्या बाजीराव पेशव्यांच्या पत्नी काशीबाई पायाच्या दुखण्याने त्रस्त होत्या. अनेक औषधोपचार करूनही गुण नव्हता. पर्वती देवीच्या नित्य दर्शनाला जाणाऱ्या नौवलोजी तावरे-पाटील या गृहस्थाकडून त्यांना देवीचे माहात्म्य कळले. देवीच्या कृपाप्रसादाने त्यांचे दुखणे बरेही झाले. नवसाची पूर्तता म्हणून काशीबाईंच्या आज्ञेवरून त्यांचे चिरंजीव नानासाहेब पेशव्यांनी पर्वती देवीचे सुरेख मंदिर बांधले, ही गोष्ट ऐतिहासिक काळापासून प्रसिद्ध आहे.

पर्वती टेकडीवर देवदेवेश्वर मंदिर सोबतच ,कार्तिकेय स्वामींचं मंदिर, विष्णु मंदिर, विठ्ठल-रुक्मिणी मंदिर इत्यादी दैवतांची मंदिरे आहेत. त्यातील कार्तिकस्वामी मंदिर आणि श्री विष्णू मंदिर ही मंदिरे देवदेवेश्वर मंदिरानंतरच्या काळात बांधली गेली. त्यातील मुख्य मंदिर हे आधुनिक हिंदु शैलीत बांधलेले आहे. त्याचा कळस उंच असून त्यावर सोन्याचा मुलामा दिला आहे. मंदिर परिसरातील चार कोपऱ्यात चार लहान मंदिरे आहेत ती म्हणजे सूर्यदेव मंदिर, गणेश मंदिर, अंबाबाई मंदिर आणि विष्णु मंदिर अशी चार मंदिरे आहेत. मुख्य मंदिराच्या पश्चिमेला भगवान कार्तिक स्वामींचे मंदिर आहे. तिथे महिलांना मंदिराच्या गाभाऱ्यात जाण्यासाठी प्रवेश दिला जात नाही. तर कार्तिक महिन्यातील त्रिपुरी पौर्णिमेच्या दिवशी म्हणजे नोव्हेंबरमध्ये मंदिरात दर्शनासाठी येथे गर्दी होते. तसेच श्रावणी सोमवारीदेखील या ठिकाणी प्रचंड गर्दी असते. तसेच १७६३च्या निजामाच्या हल्ल्यात पर्वती टेकडीचे बरेच नुकसान झाले. त्यामुळे शत्रूच्या हल्ल्याच्या वेळी देवळातल्या मूर्ती सिंहगडावर हालवण्यात आल्या होत्या, याचीदेखील इतिहासात नोंद आहे.

नानासाहेब पेशवे समाधी

१७६१ला पानिपताच्या तिसऱ्या लढाईत मराठी साम्राज्याची प्रचंड हानी झाली. मुलगा विश्वासराव व भाऊसाहेब गेल्यामुळे खचून गेलेल्या नानासाहेबांनी जून १७६१ मध्ये पर्वतीवर ''भाऊ भाऊ...'' करीत देह ठेवला. मंदिराच्या बाहेरील बाजूस नानासाहेब पेशवे यांची समाधी आहे. पर्वतीवर श्रीमंत नानासाहेब पेशवे यांनी ज्या खोलीत देह ठेवला, त्या खोलीस 'सहाणेची खोली' असे नाव होते. पुढे १९३०च्या आसपास विश्वस्त मंडळाने तेथे लहानसे स्मारक करून तेथे पेशवे घराण्यातील पुरुषांची चित्रे



लावली. पर्वतीवर अनेक थोरांचे पाय लागले. नाना फडणवीस, भाऊसाहेब, पाहिले माधवराव, महादजी शिंदे, रामशास्त्री, दुसरा बाजीराव, पेशवे घराण्यातील स्त्रिया येथे दर्शनासाठी नेहमीच येत असत. दुसऱ्या बाजीराव पेशव्यांनी खडकी येथे सुरू असलेली ब्रिटिशांबरोबरची लढाई याच पर्वतीवरून पाहिल्याची नोंद आहे.

पर्वतीवरील पेशवेकालीन संग्रहालय...

मंदिरांव्यितिरिक्त, पर्वती टेकडीवर एक संग्रहालयदेखील आहे. चित्रकार जयंत खरे यांनी पेशवे संग्रहालयाची उभारणी केली आहे. की जे संग्रालय पेशवे काळातील विविध कलाकृती प्रदर्शित. संग्रहालयात पेशव्यांचे जीवन आणि काळ दर्शिवणारी जुनी हस्तिलिखिते, शस्त्रे, नाणी आणि चित्रे आहेत. तसेच या संग्रहालयात मराठा साम्राज्यातील अनेक सुंदर वस्तूंचा संग्रह मांडला आहे.

मराठा राजवटीतील वापरण्यात येणारी 'नाणी', ब्रिटिशकालीन नाणी, विविध प्रकारच्या तलवारी, ढाल, विविध हत्यारे, बंदुका याच बरोबर पेशवे घराण्यातील व्यक्तींची चित्रे व त्यांची थोडक्यात माहिती वाचण्यास मिळते. शनिवारवाड्याचा नकाशा, १७९१ नुसार पुण्यातील विविध बागांची नावे जसे की, हिराबाग, सारसबाग, मोतीबाग, पर्वतीबाग, वानवडीची बाग, हिंगण्याची बाग, रमणबाग, वडगाव बाग, माणिकबाग, पाषाणबाग, कात्रजबाग आदी बागांची नावे येथे वाचण्यास मिळतात. पेशवेकालीन दरवाजांना लावण्यात येणारी कुलपे, अभ्यासासाठी वापरण्यात येणारी धूळपाटी, विविध पगड्या, हत्तीचा पाय अशा अनेक वस्तूंमुळे संग्रहालयाची शोभा अजून वाढवलेली आहे. पर्वती व पुणे शहराची जुन्या

काळातील छायाचित्रे हे सारे पाहत असताना पुणे शहराचा जुना इतिहास जाणून घेता येतो. २० रुपये तिकीट देऊन आपण हे संग्रहालय पाहू शकतो.

निसर्गाचं सौंदर्य, पेशवं कालीन इतिहास, मंदिरे, जुन्या काळातील पुणे शहर, पेशवंकालीन संग्रहालय, अनेक प्रकारची झाडे झुडपे टेकडीवरून दिसणारे पुणे शहराचे विहंगम दृश्य पाहण्यासाठी पर्वती टेकडीला एकदा तरी अवश्य भेट द्या.

पुस्तकांचा खजिना म्हणजे पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालय

पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालय हे केवळ पुस्तकांचे भांडार नाही, तर ते सांस्कृतिक वारसा आणि ज्ञानाचे केंद्र आहे. शतकाहून अधिक काळ चाललेल्या या संस्थेने अनेक पिढ्यांना ज्ञानाची कवाडे उघडून दिली आहेत.

प्रस्तकप्रेमींसाठी पुस्तकांचा खिजना म्हणजे पुणे मराठी प्रंथालय. हे ग्रंथालय नारायण पेठेत आहे. २ ऑक्टोबर १९११मध्ये दसऱ्याच्या दिवशी या ग्रंथालयाचं उद्घाटन केलं गेलं आणि ग्रंथालयाची सुरुवात करण्यात आली. या ग्रंथालयाची स्थापना एन. सी केळकर आणि नारायण पौगी यांच्या प्रयत्नातून केली गेली. सुरुवातीला ग्रंथालय चिटगोपेकर वाडा या ठिकाणी होतं. हा वाडा नंतर पाडण्यात आल्यामुळे नंतर नारायण पेठेत ग्रंथालयाचं बांधकाम केलं गेलं.

पण त्या वेळी नारायण पेठ अस्तित्वात नव्हती. हा परिसर त्या वेळी पूर्णपणे वेगळा होता. इथे वस्ती नव्हती संपूर्णपणे जंगल असल्यासारखी परिस्थिती होती. प्रंथालयाच्या आजूबाजूला झाडी आणि गुरांचे गोठे होते. पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालयाने जागा बदलताना वस्तीपासून दूर असल्याचा आक्षेप घेतला गेला. त्याचं कारण म्हणजे पुण्याच्या विविध भागांमध्ये वेगवेगळ्या सोयीसुविधा आणि वाचनाची महत्त्वाची परंपरा असलेली ही संस्था होती. ग्रंथालयाच्या नवीन ठिकाणी जाणे, वस्तीपासून लांब असणे, वाचनाची सुलभता कमी करणे, आणि संस्थेच्या वाचकांसाठी या बदलामुळे सहज प्रवेशाची सोय न होणे या गोष्टींवर विरोध करण्यात आला.

तथापि, बदलत्या पुण्याची ती खूण म्हणून ते पाहता येईल. शहराच्या विकासासोबतच अनेक जुन्या संस्थांची ठिकाणं आणि कार्यपद्धतीही बदलत जात आहेत. पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालयाच्या जागा बदलण्यामध्ये त्या विकासाचा भाग असू शकतो.

१९७५ ते १९८० या काळात ग्रंथालयाचा परिसर हा हळूहळू वाढवण्यात आला. नवीन झालेल्या या ग्रंथालयाचं उद्घाटन मध्य प्रदेशातील ग्वाल्हेर राजघराण्यातील सदस्य विजयराजे शिंदे यांच्याकडून केलं गेलं. त्यानंतर माजी



राष्ट्रपती दिवंगत डॉ. ए. पी. जे. अब्दुल कलाम, माजी पंतप्रधान दिवंगत अटलिबहारी वाजपेयी, मोहन भागवत, पु. ल. देशपांडे आणि शिवसेनाप्रमुख दिवंगत बाळासाहेब ठाकरे यांसारख्या अनेक नामवंत व्यक्तींनी या वास्तूला भेट दिली.

ग्रंथालयात सध्या २.५ लाखांपेक्षा जास्त पुस्तकांचा संग्रह आहे. त्यातील बहुतेक मराठी व काही इंग्रजी भाषेत आहेत. अनेक दुर्मीळ मासिकंही इथे उपलब्ध आहेत. अनेक वेगवेगळ्या लेखक, साहित्यिक आणि संस्थांनी त्यांची पुस्तकं आणि संग्रह इथे दान केले आहेत. १९३०पासून प्रसिद्ध झालेली सर्व मराठी मासिकंही ग्रंथालयात पाहायला मिळतात.

इथे सावरकर जयंती, स्वातंत्र्यदिन व ग्रंथालयाचा स्थापना दिन हे दिवस साजरे केले जातात. वेगवेगळे पुरस्कार सोहळे आयोजित केले जातात. दिवाळी, गणेशोत्सव आणि रक्षाबंधनाच्या निमित्ताने मुलांसाठी कार्यशाळांचे आयोजन केलं जातं, त्यासोबतच उन्हाळ्यात मुलांना चित्रपट दाखवले जातात. हे कार्यक्रम तळमजल्यावरील केशव सभागृहात होतात. त्याच मजल्यावर मुक्तद्वार वाचनालय आहे. मुक्तद्वार वाचनालयात ज्यांना घाई असते अशा प्रत्येकासाठी वर्तमानपत्रं आणि मासिकं उपलब्ध असतात. पहिल्या मजल्यावर मुक्तांगण बालवचन आहे. तिथे मुलांसाठी पुस्तकं, मासिकं, शैक्षणिक व्हिडिओ सीडी आणि संगणक आहेत. ग्रंथालयाच्या या भागासाठी ख्यातनाम लेखक पु. ल. देशपांडे यांनी मदत केली होती. इथे सर्व साहित्य मराठी आणि इंग्रजीत उपलब्ध आहे.

१९७०मध्ये सुरू झालेल्या अभ्यासिका विभागात सुमारे ४०० विद्यार्थ्यांच्या आसन क्षमतेसह चार वाचन कक्ष आहेत. सर्व शाखांचे विद्यार्थी इथे अभ्यासासाठी येतात. त्यांना स्वतंत्र टेबल, खुर्ची आणि लॉकर आहेत. या कक्षांसाठी काही दिवस प्रतीक्षा यादी असते. मात्र, यादी नसली तरीही अनेक वाचक कॉरिडॉरमध्ये गर्दी करतात.

ग्रंथालयातील पुस्तकं लेखक आणि पुस्तकाच्या प्रकारानुसार ठेवली गेली आहेत. इथली सर्व यंत्रणा संगणकीकृत आहे. त्यावर रोमन किंवा देवनागरी लिपीत वाचकांना पुस्तकांची उपलब्धता तपासता येते. ग्रंथालयात डिजिटल पुस्तकंही आहेत.

या ग्रंथालयातर्फे युवा वाचकांसाठी एक अनोखा उपक्रम राबवला जातो. त्यात ४० स्वयंसेवकांना प्रत्येक उन्हाळ्यात २०० पुस्तकांचा एक संच दिला जातो. त्यांनी त्यांच्या भागात घरातूनच प्रादेशिक ग्रंथालय सुरू करायचं आणि वाचन चळवळीला प्रोत्साहन द्यायचं, असा हा उपक्रम आहे.

या ग्रंथालयाचं आजीवन सदस्यांसह सध्या सहा हजार सदस्य आहेत. ग्रंथालयाचे मासिक सदस्य शुल्क ७५ रुपये आहे, तर अनामत रक्कम म्हणून ३०० रुपये घेतले जातात. वार्षिक आणि पाच वर्षांच्या सदस्यत्व योजनेचं शुल्क समान आहे. शिवाय पाच वर्षांचं शुल्क भरलेल्या सदस्यांना सहाव्या वर्षी ग्रंथालयात मुक्त प्रवेश मिळतो. ग्रंथालयात दिवाळी अंकसुद्धा प्रसिद्ध केला जातो. ७५ रुपये एवढंच



स्वतंत्र सदस्यत्व शुल्क आहे. हे ग्रंथालय रिववार वगळता रोज सकाळी ८:३० ते संध्याकाळी ८ या वेळेत सुरू असते. तळमजल्यावरील मुक्तद्वार वाचनालय मात्र सकाळी ८:३० ते दुपारी १२ आणि सायंकाळी ५ ते ८.३० या वेळेत सुरू असतं.

पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालयाचे जवळपास ११३ वर्ष पूर्ण झालेले आहेत. जग ज्याप्रमाणे बदलत आहे आधुनिकतेकडे जात आहे. त्याप्रमाणेच या ग्रंथालयानेसुद्धा आधुनिकतेची कास धरलेली आहे. ग्रंथालयात ई-बुक लायब्ररीसुद्धा आहे. या लायब्ररीत अनेक प्रकारची पुस्तकं उपलब्ध आहेत. अनेक दुर्मीळ पुस्तकांसह, नवीन प्रकाशित झालेली पुस्तकं आणि मासिकंही आपण वाचु शकतो. पुस्तकांचं स्कॅनिंग करून आपण पुस्तकं वाचु शकतो त्याप्रमाणेच या ग्रंथालयाचं संकेतस्थळही कार्यान्वित झालेलं आहे. जुनी आणि दुर्मीळ पुस्तकं आपल्याला वाचायला मिळावीत, पुस्तकं सुस्थितीत राहृन सगळ्यांना एका क्लिकमध्ये उपलब्ध व्हावीत, यासाठी ई-बुकही आता गरज बनली आहे. हा बदल स्वीकारून तंत्रज्ञानाचा सद्पयोग करून पुस्तकं ई-बुकच्या रूपात जास्तीत जास्त वाचकांपर्यंत पोहोचावीत, यासाठी पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालयाने ई-बुक लायब्ररीचा सुरू केली होती आणि त्याला उत्तम प्रतिसाद मिळतो आहे. न. चिं. केळकर यांच्या पुढाकारातून पुणे मराठी ग्रंथालयाची स्थापना झाली. सध्या ग्रंथालयात दोन लाखांहून जास्त पुस्तकं असून, जुनी, दुर्मीळ पुस्तकंही इथे उपलब्ध आहेत. पुण्यातील पुस्तकांचा खजिना असलेलं हे ग्रंथालय आहे.

या संस्थेने दोन वेळा मराठी साहित्य संमेलने घेतली होती. या संमेलनाचा उद्देश मराठी साहित्याच्या विकासाला चालना देणे, नवोदित लेखकांना एक व्यासपीठ देणे, आणि त्याचबरोबर महाराष्ट्रात मराठी भाषेच्या सांस्कृतिक अस्तित्वाचे महत्त्व जपणे होता. संमेलनांमधून विविध साहित्यिक, लेखक, कवी, आणि समीक्षक एकत्र येऊन मराठी साहित्याच्या भव्यतेला, त्यातील विविध रंगांना, आणि त्यातल्या नवनवीन चांगल्या विचारांना व्यासपीठावर आणत होते. या संमेलनांचे आयोजन संस्थेने केल्यामुळे मराठी साहित्यातील विविध विषयांवर चर्चेसाठी एक ठिकाण उपलब्ध झालं.



इतिहासाच्या पानांवर कोरलेली समृद्धीची साक्ष

पुण्याच्या मध्यभागी वसलेली महात्मा फुले मंडई, एकेकाळी 'रे मार्केट' म्हणून ओळखली जाणारी, केवळ बाजारपेठ नाही तर शहराच्या समृद्ध इतिहासाची साक्ष आहे. स्थापत्यकलेचा उत्कृष्ट नमुना आणि विविध वस्तूंचे केंद्र असलेली ही मंडई, पुणेकरांच्या जीवनाचा अविभाज्य भाग आहे.

प्याच्या मध्यभागी, जिथे इतिहासाच्या पाऊलखुणा आजही जिवंत आहेत, तिथे उभी आहे महात्मा फुले मंडई. ही केवळ एक बाजारपेठ नाही, तर पुणेकरांच्या जीवनाचा अविभाज्य भाग आहे. या मंडईच्या दगडिटांमध्ये केवळ व्यापार नाही, तर पिढ्यान्पिढ्यांची संस्कृती, परंपरा आणि समृद्धी दडलेली आहे. पुणेकरांची अन्नपूर्णा मंडई हे केवळ नाव नाही, तर या शहराच्या हृदयात वसलेल्या एका अशा स्थळाची ओळख आहे, जिथे प्रत्येक पुणेकर आपल्या गरजा पूर्ण करण्यासाठी येतो.

इतिहासाच्या गर्तेतून : एक वैभवशाली वारसा

महात्मा फुले मंडईचा इतिहास १९व्या शतकापर्यंत मागे जातो. ब्रिटिश राजवटीत, जेव्हा पुणे शहर विकसित होत होते, तेव्हा शहराच्या मध्यभागी एक मोठी बाजारपेठ उभारण्याची गरज भासली. त्यातूनच या मंडईची स्थापना झाली. ५ ऑक्टोबर १८८६ रोजी या मार्केटचे ड्यूक ऑफ कॅनॉट व लॉर्ड रे यांच्या हस्ते उद्घाटन करण्यात आले आणि त्यास 'रे मार्केट' असे नाव देण्यात आले. १९३८मध्ये हे नाव बदलून 'महात्मा फुले मंडई' असे नाव ठेवण्यात आले. सुरुवातीला ही जागा केवळ भाजीपाला आणि फळे विकण्यासाठी वापरली जात होती. कालांतराने, इथे इतर वस्तुंची दुकानेही सुरू झाली.

मंडईच्या बांधकामात तत्कालीन स्थापत्यकलेचा उत्कृष्ट नमुना दिसून येतो. भव्य दगडी कमानी, उंच खांब आणि प्रशस्त आवार यांमुळे या वास्तूला एक वेगळेच महत्त्व प्राप्त झाले आहे. त्या काळातील कुशल कारागिरांनी आपल्या कलेचा उत्कृष्ट नमुना या मंडईत सादर केला आहे. मंडईची रचना अशी आहे की, नैसर्गिक प्रकाश आणि हवा खेळती राहते, ज्यामुळे खरेदीदारांना आणि विक्रेत्यांना आराम मिळतो.

मंडईची रचना : एक स्थापत्यकलेचा चमत्कार

मंडईची रचना म्हणजे स्थापत्यकलेचा एक उत्कृष्ट नमुना आहे. भव्य प्रवेशद्वार, उंच खांब आणि प्रशस्त आवार यांमुळे या वास्तूला एक वेगळेच महत्त्व प्राप्त झाले आहे. मंडईचा आकार अष्टकोनी असून घुमटामध्ये मजले तयार केले आहेत. दुसऱ्या मजल्यावर काही दिवस नगरपालिकेचे कार्यालय होते. मंडईच्या मध्यभागी एक मोठा चौक आहे, जिथे भाजीपाला आणि फळे विकली जातात. या चौकाच्या सभोवताली दुकानांची रांग आहे, जिथे इतर वस्तू विकल्या जातात. मंडईच्या छतावर असलेल्या नक्षीकामातून नैसर्गिक प्रकाश आत येतो, ज्यामुळे मंडई नेहमीच प्रकाशमय राहते.

मंडईच्या बांधकामात वापरलेले दगड आणि विटा आजही मजबूत आहेत. या वास्तूने अनेक भूकंप आणि नैसर्गिक आपत्तींचा सामना केला आहे, तरीही ती आजही दिमाखात उभी आहे. मंडईच्या प्रत्येक दगडात आणि विटेत इतिहासाची साक्ष दडलेली आहे. मंडईच्या भिंतींवर असलेल्या जुन्या जाहिराती आणि फलक या वास्तूच्या ऐतिहासिक महत्त्वावर प्रकाश टाकतात.

आज महात्मा फुले मंडई केवळ एक बाजारपेठ राहिलेली नाही, तर ती पुणेकरांच्या जीवनाचा अविभाज्य भाग बनली आहे. इथे केवळ भाजीपाला आणि फळेच नव्हे, तर फुले, मसाले, कपडे, खेळणी आणि इतर अनेक वस्तू मिळतात. मंडईत येणारा प्रत्येक जण आपल्या गरजेनुसार वस्तू खरेदी करू शकतो. मंडईत अनेक पिढ्यांपासून व्यवसाय करणारे व्यापारी आहेत, ज्यांनी आपल्या कुटुंबाचा वारसा पुढे चालवला आहे.

मंडईत अनेक खाद्यपदार्थांचे स्टॉल्स आहेत, जिथे पुणेकरांना पारंपरिक खाद्यपदार्थांचा आस्वाद घेता येतो. वडापाव, मिसळ पाव, भेळ आणि इतर अनेक चविष्ट पदार्थ इथे मिळतात. मंडईत येणारा प्रत्येक जण आपल्या आवडीनुसार खाद्यपदार्थांचा आनंद घेऊ शकतो.

मंडईत अनेक सांस्कृतिक कार्यक्रम आणि उत्सव साजरे केले जातात. गणेशोत्सव, नवरात्र आणि इतर सणांच्या वेळी मंडईला विशेष महत्त्व प्राप्त होते. मंडईत अनेक सामाजिक आणि धार्मिक कार्यक्रम आयोजित केले जातात, ज्यामुळे या वास्तूला एक वेगळेच महत्त्व प्राप्त होते. मंडईजवळ आर्यन व मिनव्हें अशी दोन सिनेमागृहे होती. सध्या ती पाडून, तेथे वाहनतळाची व्यवस्था केली आहे. मंडईच्या दर्शनी कमानीच्या पुढे लोकमान्य टिळकांचा संगमरवरी पूर्णाकृती पुतळा आहे. या पुतळ्याचे अनावरण २२ जुलै १९२४ रोजी मोतीलाल नेहरू यांनी केले, त्यावर आता मेघडंबरी बसविली आहे. मंडईच्या मध्य भागामध्ये विष्णुशास्त्री चिपळूणकर यांचा लहान पुतळा बसविण्यात आला होता त्याचे उद्घाटन महात्मा गांधींनी केले होते. मंडईच्या वरच्या मजल्यावर लॉर्ड म्युझियम होते. ते सध्या घोलेरोडवरील स्वतंत्र इमारतीत नेण्यात आले आहे.

मंडई विद्यापीठ ही संज्ञा काँग्रेसचे नेते काकासाहेब गाडगीळ यांनी प्रसारित केली. मंडई हे पूर्वी मोठे सत्ताकेंद्र होते. बाबूराव सणस आणि अनेक नेत्यांचा उत्कर्ष येथूनच झाला. मंडईच्या पाठिंब्यावर अनेकांनी निवडणुका जिंकल्या. समाजाचे ज्ञान या मंडई विद्यापीठातून अनेकांना मिळते. मंडईचा गणपती हा मानाचा होय.

मंडई आणि व्यवसाय

मंडईत अनेक लहान-मोठे व्यापारी व्यवसाय करतात.

पुण्यातील प्रसिद्ध लॉर्ड रे मार्केट, ज्याला आज आपण महात्मा फुले मंडई म्हणून ओळखतो, त्याच्या नावाच्या इतिहासात सामाजिक आणि राजकीय घडामोडींचा संगम आहे. ब्रिटिश काळात, मुंबईचे तत्कालीन गव्हर्नर लॉर्ड रे यांच्या नावावरून या मार्केटची स्थापना झाली. १८९० ते १८९५ या दरम्यान त्यांच्या कार्यकाळात हे मार्केट उभे राहिले, त्यामुळे त्यांच्या सन्मानार्थ त्याला 'लॉर्ड रे मार्केट' असे नाव देण्यात आले. मात्र, या बांधकामाच्या वेळी समाजसुधारक महात्मा जोतिबा फुले यांनी पुणे नगरपालिकेचे सदस्य असताना या प्रकल्पाला विरोध दर्शवला. त्यांचे म्हणणे होते की, या मंडईसाठी होणारा खर्च शिक्षणावर खर्च करणे अधिक योग्य आहे, विशेषतः गरीब मुलांच्या शिक्षणासाठी. तसेच, गरीब दुकानदारांना परवडणारी दुकाने उपलब्ध करून द्यावीत, असा त्यांचा



आग्रह होता. त्यांच्या विरोधामुळे मंडईच्या बजेटमध्ये एक लाख रुपयांची कपात करण्यात आली. स्वातंत्र्यानंतर, या मार्केटला महात्मा फुले यांचे नाव देऊन त्यांच्या सामाजिक कार्याचा गौरव करण्यात आला. अशाप्रकारे, लॉर्ड रे मार्केटचा महात्मा फुले मंडईपर्यंतचा प्रवास ऐतिहासिक आणि सामाजिक दृष्ट्या महत्त्वाचा ठरतो. मंडईमुळे अनेक लोकांना रोजगार मिळतो. मंडईत मिळणाऱ्या स्थानिक वस्तू आणि कलाकृतींमुळे स्थानिक व्यवसायाला चालना मिळते. मंडईत होणाऱ्या व्यापारातून पुणे शहराच्या अर्थव्यवस्थेला हातभार लागतो.

मंडईचे आजचे स्वरूप

आज मंडईमध्ये आधुनिकतेचा स्पर्श दिसून येतो. सीसीटीव्ही कॅमेरे, वाय-फाय आणि इतर आधुनिक सुविधांमुळे मंडई अधिक सुरक्षित आणि सोयीस्कर झाली आहे. मंडईच्या स्वच्छतेवर विशेष लक्ष दिले जाते, ज्यामुळे खरेदीदारांना आणि विक्रेत्यांना आरोग्यदायी वातावरण मिळते. मंडईच्या आजूबाजूला अनेक लहान दुकाने आणि स्टॉल्स आहेत, जिथे स्थानिक वस्तू आणि कलाकृती विकल्या जातात. मंडईच्या परिसरात अनेक ऐतिहासिक वास्तू आणि मंदिरे आहेत, ज्यामुळे या स्थळाला एक वेगळेच महत्त्व प्राप्त झाले आहे.

महात्मा फुले मंडई केवळ एक बाजारपेठ नाही, तर ती पुणेकरांच्या जीवनाचा अविभाज्य भाग आहे. या मंडईच्या माध्यमातून पुणेकरांना केवळ वस्तूच मिळत नाहीत, तर एक समृद्ध इतिहास आणि संस्कृतीचा अनुभवही मिळतो.

पुणे पुराणे

शवे काळात पुण्याचे वैभव होते. शिवकालातील पुण्याचा इतिहासही सर्वांना माहीत आहे . पण त्याही आधी हजारो वर्षांपूर्वी इथे मानवी वस्ती होती. लाख दीड लाख वर्षांपूर्वी. अश्मयुगातील आदिमानव इथेच मुळा-मुठेच्या संगमावर नांदला होता . डॉ. ह. नी. सांकलिया यांनी डेक्कन कॉलेजच्या आवारात आपले घर बांधले होते.

पुण्याच्या आसपास संशोधनाच्या निमित्ताने त्यांची भ्रमंती चालू असे. बंड गार्डन जवळ त्यांना सुमारे 50 हजार वर्षांपूर्वीची दगडी हत्यारे सापडली होती, तर त्यांच्या घराच्या बागेत खणताना त्यांना एक लाख वर्षांपूर्वीची हत्यारे सापडली होती. डेक्कन कॉलेजच्या आवारात दक्षिणोत्तर जाणारी अशी एक प्रस्तराची भिंत आहे. तिच्यातील दगड हा अतिशय उत्कृष्ट प्रतिचा असतो. त्याचे करपे अत्यंत धारदार असतात . या प्रकारचे मानवाने मुद्दाम तयार केलेले प्रस्तराचे काही चिलके डॉक्टरांना सापडले होते. ते ज्या गाभ्यातून काढले त्याचा गाभाही त्यांना सापडला . याचाच अर्थ असा होता की जिथे आज डेक्कन कॉलेज आहे त्या परिसरात आद्यअश्मकालीन मानव किमान एक लाख वर्षांपूर्वी वावरत होता हे निश्चित.

आज दत्तवाडी सिमेंटच्या जंगलात हरवली आहे, मात्र काही वर्षांपूर्वी तिथे तांबड्या मातीचे थर सापडले होते. हे थर साधारण 70 हजार वर्षांपूर्वी जो पुण्यात पाऊस पडला होता त्या पावसाळी वातावरणात तयार झाले होते. या मध्याश्मयुगात पुणे आणि परिसरात मानवी वस्ती वाढलेली दिसते .

पुण्यातील आद्य शेतकऱ्यांची वसाहत साधारण इसवी सन पूर्व चौदाशेच्या सुमारास असावी. पुण्याजवळ इनामगाव येथे ताम्र पाषाण युगीन वसाहत आणि त्याचे वैभवशाली नगरीत झालेले रूपांतर आपल्याला आढळले आहे. थेऊर येथे आद्य शेतकऱ्यांची एक वसाहत आढळून आलेली आहे . ती मुळा नदीच्या उजव्या तीरावर आहे. तर नदीच्या डाव्या तीरावर साष्ट्रेवाडी येथे ताम्रपाषाण युगीन अवशेष सापडले आहेत. या दोन्ही वसाहती अतिशय छोट्या म्हणजे एखाद्या वाडीसारख्या होत्या. म्हणजे साधारण पंधरा-वीस झोपड्या असाव्यात अशा प्रकारच्या. केंद्र सरकारच्या पुरातत्त्व खात्यातर्फे डॉ एस आर राव यांनी येथे उत्खनन केले होते . त्यात त्यांना चौकोनी घरांचे अवशेष सापडले. त्याच्या भिंती कुडाच्या आणि छप्पर गवतानी साकारलेले असे असावे. तसेच घरातील भांडी तांबड्या रंगाची आणि त्यावर काळ्या रंगात नक्षी अशा प्रकारची होती . या भांड्यांमध्ये वाडगे, तोटीचा चंबू , पाण्यासाठी हांडे आणि धान्य साठवण्यासाठी रांजण यांचा समावेश आहे. या वसाहतीत प्रामुख्याने सातूची लागवड केली जात होती. गह् आणि ज्वारी पिकवल्याचे पुरावे अन्यत्र सापडले आहेत .तसेच हुलगा , वाटाणा, घेवडा आधी पिकेही तेव्हा काढली जात. जोडीला पशपालन होते.



डेक्कन कॉलेजचा वारसा

६ ऑक्टोबर १८२१ रोजी स्थापन झालेले डेक्कन कॉलेज, पुणे, भारतातील शैक्षणिक आणि सांस्कृतिक वारसा जपत, संशोधन आणि समाजबदलात अग्रगण्य भूमिका बजावत आहे. पुण्यातील पहिले महाविद्यालय आजही जानाचा दिवा प्रज्वलित करत आहे.

🖛 जया दशमी च्या दिवशी म्हणजेच सहा ऑक्टोबर व अठराशे एकवीस (०६-१०-१८२१) विश्रामबाग वाड्यात हिन्दू कॉलेजची स्थापना झाली. मुंबईचे तत्कालीन गव्हर्नर माउंट स्टुअर्ट एल्फिन्स्टन (१७७९-१८५९) यांच्या पढाकाराने हा ऐतिहासिक प्रवास सुरू झाला. तसेच काही वर्षात दिनांक सात जून (०७-०६-१८५१) रोजी पुना कॉलेज असे नामकरण करण्यात आले. प्राचीन शास्त्रा बरोबर हिंदु कायदा, गणित या विषयाचा समावेश अभ्यासक्रमांत करण्याचा निर्णय झाला. विश्रामबाग वाड्याची जागा अपुरी पडू लागल्यानंतर, महाविद्यालयाच्या इमारतीसाठी सर कुरसेटजी जमशेदजी जीजीभॉय यांच्या आर्थिक मदतीमुळे नवीन इमारतीची स्वप्नं पूर्ण झाले. १५ ऑक्टोबर १८६४ मध्ये सर हेनरी फ्रेरे यांच्या हस्ते येरवडा (पुणे) येथे सध्याच्या इमारतीची स्थापना करण्यात आली.

डेक्कन कॉलेज हे ब्रिटिश कालखंडात पश्चिम भारतात महत्त्वाचे शैक्षणिक केंद्र होते. हे कॉलेज स्वातंत्र्यापूर्वीच्या काळात जेवढे महत्त्वाचे होते, ते आज २०० वर्षांनंतरसुद्धा तेवढेच आहे. एक ऐतिहासिक वारसा स्थळ आणि शैक्षणिकरित्या प्रबळ असे डेक्कन कॉलेज भारतात तिसरे, तर पुण्यातील (महाराष्ट्र) पहिले महाविद्यालय म्हणून उभे आहे.

इतिहासात जेव्हा आपण डोकावतो, तेव्हा हे लक्ष्यात येते की, भारत आणि येथील भूमी, भौगोलिकरित्या स्वर्ग आहे. या मुळे परकीय आक्रमण आणि सत्तेत टिकून राहण्यासाठी अनेक प्रयत्न या भूमीवर करण्यात आले. या सगळ्यात शिक्षण लोकांचे शिक्षणाकडे दुर्लक्ष होत गेले. शिक्षण प्रत्येक कोपऱ्यात पोहोचावी ह्यासाठी सावित्रीबाई ज्योतीला फुले, डॉ. भीमराव आंबेडकर, स्वामी विवेकानंद, राजा राम मोहन रॉय, ईश्वरचंद्र विद्यासागर, रमाबाई रानडे,



अशा अनेक शिक्षण पुरस्कर्ते व क्रांतिकारकांनी यशस्वी प्रयत्न केले. अशा वातावरणात सरसेनापती खंडेराव दाभाडे यांनी दक्षिणा निधी अंतर्गत, तर सर कुरसेटजी जमशेदजी जीजीभॉय, स्टुअर्ट एल्फिन्स्टन, पेशवा बाजीराव (दुसरे) यांच्या सोबतीने व सुसंगतीने (१८२१) रोजी हिन्दु कॉलेज स्थापन झाले. जे कालांतराने डेक्कन कॉलेज म्हणून नामांकित झाले. हे पाऊल ऐतिहासिक होते. ब्रिटिशांनी केलेल्या जेवढ्या गोष्टी, बदल हे चांगले वाटत असतील, तरी ते त्यांनी स्वतःच्या सोयी साठीच केले, भारतीयांसाठी नाही, तर हा एकतऱ्फा विचार होय. शैक्षणिक बाबींचा जर विचार केला, तर लाभ हा अनेक विद्यार्थ्यांना झाला, बदलांचा प्रभाव अनेकांवर पडला (वाईट गोष्टी वगळता) यात काही दुमत नसावे. जातीपातीच्या विळख्यात अडकलेली लोक जेव्हा महाविद्यालयात एकत्र बसू लागली तेव्हा मात्र मनाला पडलेले प्रश्न आणि विचारांमध्ये घडलेले सामाजिक बदल हे सगळे शिक्षणामुळे आणि डेक्कन कॉलेजसारख्या महाविद्यालय आणि अनेक विद्यालय आणि शाळांमुळे शक्य झाले.

हिन्दू कॉलेज ते पुना कॉलेज ते डेक्कन महाविद्यालयापर्यंतचा संपूर्ण प्रवास परिश्रमाने आणि उत्तम कामगिरीने पाहायला मिळतो. कॉलेजच्या स्वातंत्र्यपूर्व काळातील माजी विद्यार्थ्यांचा जर विचार केला, तर सर आर. के भांडारकर, लोकमान्य बाळ गंगाधर टिळक, गोपाळ गणेश आगरकर, गुरुदेव रानडे, विश्वनाथ काशीनाथ राजवाडे, विष्णू शास्त्री चिपळूणकर, सेनापती बापट, तात्यासाहेब केळकर आणि विष्णू शास्त्री भातखंडे यांच्यासारख्या अनेक विचारवंत, क्रांतिकारी व्यक्तींच्या, विद्यार्थीदिशेत शैक्षणिक प्रवास पाहायला मिळतो. ज्ञान प्राप्त करण्या व्यतिरिक्त, ज्ञान देणारे म्हणजे कृष्ण शास्त्री चिपळूणकर, कुरूपता लक्ष्मण छत्रे, इरावती कर्वे यांचा शिक्षक म्हणून अतुलनीय योगदान दिसून येते. सन १९३४मध्ये ब्रिटिश सरकारने डेक्कन कॉलेज बंद केले. तथापि कॉलेजच्या माजी विद्यार्थ्यांनी याविरुद्ध उच्च न्यायालयात दाद मागितली. त्यांच्या व पुण्यातील शिक्षणप्रेमी नागरिकांच्या प्रयत्नांमुळे उच्च न्यायालयाने डेक्कन कॉलेज पुन्हा सुरू करण्याचा आदेश दिला. त्यानुसार १७ ऑगस्ट १९३९ रोजी डेक्कन महाविद्यालय पदव्युत्तर व संशोधन संस्था या नावाने कॉलेज पुन्हा सुरू झाले.

जसा काळ पुढे सुरू लागला तसं डेक्कन कॉलेजमध्ये प्राचीन भारतीय इतिहास, संस्कृती व पुरातत्त्व, भाषाविज्ञान, मध्ययुगीन व मराठा कालखंडाचा इतिहास, समाज विज्ञान, मानवशास्त्र आणि संस्कृतभाषा या विविध विषयांवर संशोधन चालू झाला.

१९९४-९५मध्ये अभिमत विद्यापीठाचा दर्जा डेक्कन कॉलेजला प्राप्त झाला. तेव्हापासून संस्थेचे प्राचीन भारतीय इतिहास, संस्कृती व पुरातत्त्व, भाषा शास्त्र आणि संस्कृत व कोष शास्त्र असे तीन विभाग कार्यरत आहेत.

तसेच मराठा कालखंडाच्या इतिहासाची मळ साधने असणारे स्वतंत्र संग्रहालय येथे आहे. जेव्हा भारतीय इतिहास संस्कृत व पुरातत्त्व विभागांची स्थापना १९३९मध्ये प्रा. सांकलिया यांनी केली. तेव्हापासूनच विभागाने देशाच्या सर्व प्रदेशांमध्ये प्रागैतिहासिक ते मध्ययुगीन काळातील स्थळांवर क्षेत्रीय संशोधनाचे प्रकल्प हाती घेतले. आजवर केलेल्या उत्खननाच्या आणि संशोधनाच्या क्षेत्रात डेक्कन कॉलेजचा मोलाचा वाटा आहे. या सर्व संशोधन व उत्खननाचा मूळ उद्देश अर्थात मानवी संस्कृतीचे अध्ययन आणि त्याचा विकास हाच आहे. पुरातत्त्व विभागाचे रंगपूर, कोल्हापुर येथील उत्खनन असो, किंवा प्रा. सांकलिया यांच्या पाहणीखाली सातवाहन काळाचे अवशेष व साहित्य यांचा शोध असो. दख्खनच्या नद्यांचे विश्लेषण असो. नेवासे येथील उत्खनन, ताम्र पाषाण संस्कृतीचा अभ्यास जोर्वे. नाशिक, चांदोली वगैरे स्थळांचे विश्लेषण करून पाहायला मिळतात.

भारतातील ताम्र पाषाण युगीन संस्कृतीला प्रकाशात आणण्याचे श्रेय डेक्कन कॉलेजकडे जाते. याच काळातील अतिप्रगत संस्कृती म्हणजे हडप्पा अथवा सिंधू संस्कृती होय. या संस्कृतीचे विविध पैलूंबर संशोधन सुरू झाले. गुजरातमधील कुंताशी हे गाव त्या संस्कृतीचे आंतरराष्ट्रीय व्यापारातील महत्त्वाचे केंद्र होते, असे लक्ष्यात आले.

द्वितीया संचालक भाषा शास्त्राचे डॉ. सुमित्र मंगेश कत्रे यांच्या नेतृत्वाखाली पहिली ध्वनी शाखा प्रयोग शाळांमधील डेक्कन कॉलेजमध्ये सुरू झाले.

डॉ. कन्ने यांनी संस्थेत ऐतिहासिक तत्त्वावर आधारित संस्कृत शब्दकोश प्रकल्पात सुरू केला. त्यातून २३ लाख शब्दांचा, एक कोटी संदर्भांना युक्त असे स्क्रिप्टोरियम सुसंगती झाले. वेदांत रसायनशास्त्र, शिल्पशास्त्र, अशा ६२ विद्या शाखांमधून अनेक शब्दांचे आणि त्यांच्या संदर्भांचे अर्थही ऐतिहासिक क्रमाने दिले आहेत. हे विश्वकोशाचे वैशिष्ट्य आहे.


पुढील पाऊल टाकत, संशोधनात भारताचा गौरव वाढवणाऱ्या डेक्कन कॉलेज अभिमत विद्यापीठाने ०६ ऑक्टोबर २०२१ रोजी आपल्या स्थापनेची दोनशे वर्ष पूर्ण केली आहेत. मराठीच्या बोटींचे सर्वेक्षण व प्रतिमांकन, तसेच गोरे वाडा, जुन्नर, बोरी येथील उत्खनन व अवशेषांचे संरक्षण या चालू प्रकल्पांसह आगामी वर्षात नवीन छोटे अभ्यासक्रम, ग्रंथांचे लेखन, संपादन, प्रकाशन करण्याची योजना संस्थेने हाती घेतली.

सं श्रुतेन गमेमिह! (Let us be united with knowledge) अशा संदेशा सह, डेक्कन कॉलेज ५०००हून अधिक विद्यार्थी घडविण्यात यशस्वी ठरले आहे. राष्ट्रीय मूल्यांकन आणि मान्यता परिषद (NAAC) जी एक सार्वजनिक स्वायत्त संस्था आहे, जिचे काम प्रामुख्याने भारतातील उच्च शिक्षण संस्थांचे मूल्यांकन आणि मान्यता देते. ह्या अंतर्गत डेक्कन कॉलेजला 'ए ग्रेड' (A grade) चा उत्तम श्रेणीतील दर्जा प्राप्त झाला आहे.

कॉलेजचे सध्याचे प्रभारी कुलपती डॉ. प्रसाद जोशी काम पाहत आहेत. पुरातत्त्व शास्त्र, संस्कृत व शब्दकोश (Lexicography), भाषा शास्त्र, संग्रहालय शास्त्र, पाण्याखालील पुरातत्त्व शास्त्र, बुद्धिस्ट पर्यटन, डिप्लोमा इन हेरिटेज साइट मॅनेजमेंट असे महत्त्वाचे विषय डेक्कन कॉलेजच्या गुणात्मक अभ्यास कामाचा भाग आहे.

जर आजची परिस्थिती पाहिली तर, पुण्यातील डेक्कन कॉलेज हे आजसुद्धा शिक्षण, सांस्कृतिक वारसा आणि सामाजिक बांधीलकीचे केंद्र म्हणून महत्त्वाची भूमिका बजावत आहे. या संस्थेने भारताच्या शिक्षण पद्धतीत अनेक बदल आणि विकास पाहिले आहेत. महाविद्यालयाने शैक्षणिक कार्यक्रमांचा विस्तार करणे, संशोधन क्षमता मजबूत करणे आणि विद्यार्थ्यांना अधिक समृद्ध शिक्षण वातावरण देण्यासाठी पायाभूत सुविधा वाढवणे यासाठी अनेक प्रयास व योजना आखल्या आहेत.

आंतरराष्ट्रीय स्तरावर शैक्षणिक देवाणघेवाण संशोधन भागीदारीला प्रोत्साहन देण्यासाठी महाविद्यालय सिक्रयपणे आंतरराष्ट्रीय संस्थांशी सहयोग करत आहे, ज्यामुळे डेक्कन कॉलेज ज्ञानाचे जागतिक केंद्र म्हणून अधिक दृढ होत आहे. हे सगळे चालू असताना, कॉलेजची नवनवीनतेसाठी असलेली बांधीलकी आणि प्रगतिशील विचारशैली पाहता डेक्कन कॉलेज भविष्यातही महत्त्वपूर्ण भूमिका बजावेल, यात काही शंका नाही.



The Historic Heart of Pune's Freedom Struggle

Nestled in the historic lanes of Pune stands Kesari Wada, a monument that transcends its architectural beauty to embody India's unyielding spirit during the freedom struggle. This remarkable heritage site served as both the residence of revolutionary leader Bal GangadharTilak and the headquarters of his influential newspaper, Kesari. As a crucible of nationalist thought and fearless journalism, Kesari Wada became the nucleus from which the demand for India's independence resonated across the nation. Today, it stands as a living testament to Tilak's enduring legacy and the power of the written word in challenging colonial rule.

The Historic Monument

Mesari Wada, located in the heart of Pune, is a landmark of immense historical significance. Known as the epicenter of nationalist movements in Maharashtra, this iconic structure was once the residence of the great freedom fighter, Bal Gangadhar Tilak. It was from here that Tilak launched his powerful campaigns against British rule, using the

press and public gatherings to ignite the spirit of independence among Indians.

Originally known as Gaikwad Wada, Kesari Wada was acquired by Bal Gangadhar Tilak in 1905. It became the headquarters of the famous newspaper Kesari, which Tilak had founded in 1881. The newspaper played a crucial role in spreading nationalist ideas and mobilizing people against British oppression. Tilak, known as "The Father of Indian Unrest," used Kesari as a tool to awaken political consciousness and demand self-rule (Swaraj). Apart from its association with journalism, Kesari Wada was also a hub for cultural and social movements. It was here that Tilak revived the grand public celebration of Ganesh Chaturthi in 1893, transforming it into a festival that brought people together across caste and class distinctions. This initiative strengthened national unity and was later adopted across India.

The Influential Newspaper

Kesari, as a newspaper, remains one of India's most influential publications, historically associated with the fight for independence. Established in the late 19th century, it played a crucial role in shaping public opinion against British rule. Founded by Bal Gangadhar Tilak, the newspaper became a powerful voice for nationalism, social reform, and political awareness. Even today, Kesari continues to hold historical significance in Indian journalism.

Launched on January 4, 1881, in Pune, Maharashtra, Kesari was founded by Bal Gangadhar Tilak, along with Gopal Ganesh Agarkar, Vishnushastri Chiplunkar, and Mahadev Ballal Namjoshi. It was published in Marathi, with an English counterpart, The Mahratta, also introduced. The newspaper's primary goal was to spread awareness about social, political, and economic issues affecting Indians under British rule. Tilak used Kesari to advocate for Swarai (self-rule) and expose British oppression. His strong and fearless writings led to several legal confrontations with the colonial government.

Kesari became a mouthpiece for nationalist ideas, inspiring people to fight for independence. Through Kesari, Tilak spread the idea that independence was the birthright of every Indian, popularizing the phrase: "Swaraj is my birthright, and I shall have it." The newspaper criticized British exploitation, high taxation, and repressive laws that affected Indian farmers and workers. While Tilak did not



openly call for violence, his writings encouraged youth to resist British rule. He supported revolutionaries like the Chapekar Brothers and Khudiram Bose. Kesari also promoted public celebrations of Ganesh Chaturthi and ShivajiJayanti, turning them into platforms for spreading nationalist sentiments.

In 1908, Kesari published an article supporting a violent act against British officials, which led to Tilak's arrest and imprisonment for six years in Mandalay, Burma (now Myanmar). Despite this, the newspaper continued its nationalist mission.

Architectural Significance and Present Day

Kesari Wada is a classic example of 19th-century Peshwa-style architecture, with spacious courtyards, intricately carved wooden balconies, and sturdy stone foundations. The structure reflects the grandeur of Maratha-era residences while serving as a symbol of resistance and reform. Inside, visitors can explore various artifacts, including Tilak's personal belongings, rare photographs, and letters that document his struggle for independence.

Laila Majnu- A Film Review

Qais, a boy without a care, a connoisseur of mountains and music, is not yet tamed by society, but he chooses to surrender himself. When Qais says, "Yeh pahad mujhe bahut fascinate karta hai, chhodunga nahi, dekh lunga kya hai us paar," it signifies, for me, crossing the line of mundanity and giving in to oneself. Qais, once the epitome of fun, becomes patient, while on the other side, we see Laila, who was fierce in her ways, losing herself. Her spark dims, her judgment becomes



clouded, and she gives up, unable to bear her father's scrutiny.

The Psychology of Deception : How Brands Make You Believe in La La Land

Dubious consumers might end up believing the ad's message which become the norm and are accepted as facts. Knowledge is the force for liberation from manipulative brands and making wise decisions on the products we consume.

Tanipulative advertisements are a dominant force used by the majority of brands to control customer behaviour through exaggeration and fabrication. Such advertisements rely on human psychology, making the customers perceive certain things that don't actually exist. No matter if it is a cosmetic that promises to grant radiant skin, a health supplement that promises magical results, or detergent that claims to be able to eliminate even the toughest stains without any effort, these commercials shape customer expectations in favour of the company instead of the client.

One of the most powerful psychological techniques used under false

advertising is the placebo effect. When a consumer feels that a product will deliver as stated, their mind will lead them to believe they are witnessing the intended results, regardless of the fact that the product itself does not really have much or any effect. This phenomenon is most commonly seen in cosmetics and personal products; which care companies overemphasize when advertising. One such example is a well-known soap brand that used to claim that they "hold a PhD in removing body tan." This daring claim, backed by sophisticated packaging, clever branding, and big-budget commercials, made consumers believe that regular use of the soap would whiten tanned skin. Yet

in the real world, most soaps are ineffective at removing embedded tan since tanning is a result of melanin production in the skin and not surface grime or contaminants.

Although there is no scientific proof to validate such claims, many consumers have claimed to notice effects simply because they expected the product to do so. That is where suggestibility enters. Ads. normally presenting radiant testimonials, dramatic before-and-after pseudo-scientific and photos. declarations, generate an impressive illusion of effectiveness. Even when nothing is actually changing, customers may experience that something is, since their minds have learned to anticipate it. This forms long-term brand loyalty, since customers keep on buying the product, believing that it delivers its promise.

Social proof is another psychological strategy used in manipulative advertising. individuals When see celebrities. influencers, or even actors who are dermatologists or specialists playing them in advertisements, they tend to trust the claims of the product more. The belief that "if so many people are using it, it must be effective" has a lot to do with making consumer choices. In addition to this, these advertisements tend to bring up a problem the consumer would not have necessarily cared about otherwise, like irregular skin colour, dryness, darkening, and then offer their product as the final answer. It creates insecurities and makes people buy the product not necessarily because they want it, but because they've been assured that they do.

Brands also bank on the force of repetition. A repeated message over various channels television, social media, print advertising ultimately imprints itself on the consumer's mind. Doubtful purchasers might come to think the ad is true after being exposed to it several times. By way of continuous exposure, these overstated assertions are normalized and thought to be genuine.

While consumer protection legislation is in place to police misleading advertising, loopholes within the law permit most brands to make false claims without suffering major repercussions. Advertisers craft their words in advertisements with great care to stay technically within the law, using vague terms like "clinically proven" or "dermatologically tested," which do not necessarily mean the product works. Consequently, brands continue to influence consumer attitudes without being held responsible for the true results of their products.

Finally, deceptive advertising is a psychological strategy that plays on trust, expectation. suggestibility. and Consumers need to be more critical of marketing tactics and use independent investigation, genuine reviews, individual judgment instead of being swayed by clever ads. Awareness is the solution to breaking the deception of branding manipulative and making informed choices about the foods we eat.

TATA AVINYA

Tata Avinya, first introduced as a concept at the 2024 Auto Expo, is a giant leap towards the next generation of electric vehicles. According to Tata, the AVINYA uses lightweight materials, and its battery supports ultra-fast charging,

offering a range of 500 km in under 30 minutes! Tata displayed this concept at the 2024 Expo, and in the 2025 Expo, they presented the production-ready version, which looks like this:

Isn't it amazing? The car features ventilated seats in both the first and second rows, ADAS level-2, and more. The expected price is ₹0-42 lakh, with the vehicle set to be launched in 2026.

TATA Sierra

First launched in 1991, the Tata Sierra was a 3-door sports utility vehicle that pioneered the 4WD system. It was powered by a naturally aspirated 2.0-liter 483 DL4 cylinder engine with a G76 5-speed manual transmission, which was an industry first.

At the 2024 Auto Expo, Tata debuted the next-gen Sierra concept.

The production-ready model was launched at the 2025 Auto Expo.



It's fantastic! The new Sierra is powered by a 1.5-litre engine producing 170 BHP and comes with features such as three 12.3-inch screens, a panoramic sunroof, and ventilated front seats. It also includes safety features like six airbags (as standard), a 360-degree camera, and ADAS. The expected pricing is ₹0.50 lakh, with sales set to start in the third quarter

of 2025.

2) Mahindra

Founded in 1945, Mahindra & Mahindra (M&M) is a leading Indian multinational conglomerate with a strong presence in the automotive industry, headquartered in Mumbai. Here are some amazing concepts they showcased at the Auto Expo:

XEV9e

Mahindra claims that the XEV9e has bold, futuristic styling, strong road presence, and spacious interiors with comfortable seats and fine ergonomics. Powered by a 282 BHP motor, the XEV9e can accelerate from 0-100 km/h in just 6.8 seconds! It offers a remarkable range of 540 km on a single charge. The concept was launched at the 2024 Auto Expo, but the production-ready model was unveiled at the 2025 Expo.

It is stunning! This vehicle comes with ADAS level-2, a panoramic sunroof, a driver monitoring system, auto park assist, and more. The price is around ₹0 lakh, and sales have already begun.

BE₆

In addition to the XEV9e, Mahindra also launched the BE6. The concept of the BE6 was introduced in November 2024.



The production-ready model was launched at the 2025 Auto Expo, and the sales for the BE6 also started there.

Bhimashankar — Unseen, Untouched, and Pristine

Until then, I had only seen such sights in textbooks and storybooks—now, I was living them! There is so much more that the Bhimashankar region has to offer over and above the historical significance.

Bhimashankar, the moment this word is uttered, we are reminded of the beautiful temple of Lord Shiva and its historical significance. But there is so much more that the Bhimashankar region has to offer. Located 125 km away from Pune in Bhorgiri, Khed, this place is a wonder in itself.

I had the opportunity to travel to Bhimashankar back in 2013, but the experience was so profound that it has lasted a lifetime! In my era of exploring and trekking (don't mind me talking like a 60-year-old), I have explored about 9-10 forts, including Sinhagad, Purandar, Vishramgad, Rajgad, Pratapgad, Lohagad, Panhala, and, of course, Bhimashankar, which is actually a forest trek.

Geographically speaking, Bhimashankar is located at 3,250 feet (990 meters) above sea level. While the distance of this trek might seem short compared to other treks, the difficulty level ranges from moderate to difficult, making it unsuitable for beginners.

Now, let me take you all on a brief tour of Bhimashankar.

The Journey Begins

It all started at 5 AM near our school gate, where the registered trek enthusiasts had assembled, eager to start the day's adventure. We climbed into our respective buses, and just like that, the adventure began! We reached the base village by 7 AM (perks of leaving early). As we stepped out, what we saw in front of us was unbelievable—



at least for us city people!

Since it was the monsoon season, we were greeted by a light and refreshing drizzle, as if nature itself was preparing us for the adventure ahead.

Walking through lush green fields, we saw farmers eyeing us with curiosity, and animals like cows, buffaloes, goats, and hens roaming freely. Until then, I had only seen such sights in textbooks and storybooks—now, I was living them! At first, the trek felt like a morning walk on the "Tekdi" (a small hill), until we reached our first break spot, where our trek guide informed us:

"Beta, ye toh shuruwat hai, aage dekho hota hai kya!"

Long story short, we had to climb two mountains! We even jokingly asked our trek guide, "Sir, did the bus driver refuse to drop us any further?"

Our first interesting challenge came when we had to climb up a hill that looked colossal...



राजघराण्याची सून म्हणून समाजात वावरत असताना, लोकांमध्ये मिसळत असताना तिथल्या समस्यांची जाणीव होऊन, त्यांचं निराकरण करणं हा खरा राजधर्म. देवी अहिल्याबाईंनी नेमकी हीच नस ओळखून त्या काळच्या समाजामध्ये स्त्रीशिक्षण आणि सांस्कृतिक बैठकीवर भर दिला. दुरदृष्टी लाभलेल्या देवी अहिल्याबाई हे जाणून होत्या की स्वयंपाकघराला बांधून राहिलेली स्त्री, हे समाजाचं भविष्य असूच शकत नाही. स्त्रीचा स्वाभिमान आणि तिचं आयुष्य हे केवळ तिच्या हाताच्या चवीवर जपणारे त्या काळातले सगळे नरपुंगव, स्त्रियांच्या व्यक्तिमत्त्वाविषयी आणि पर्यायाने तिने आत्मविश्वासाने जगण्याविषयी सकारात्मक नसलेला काळ तो. केवळ प्रुषच कशाला, खुद्द स्त्रियाच स्त्रियांचे पाय खेचायला जात असताना,हा विचार एका संस्थानाच्या गादीने करणं, म्हणजे खूपच दुर्लभ. मात्र त्याच कारणामुळे, अधिकारी व्यक्तीच्या जाणतेपणामुळे, त्या काळी हे शक्य झालं. देवी अहिल्याबाईंनी मंदिरं बांधली, घाट बांधले, उत्कृष्ट, कुशल राजकारणाचा वसा चालवला, समाजकारणाची मोट बांधली. स्त्रियांनी आपल्या प्रतिभेला ओळखून, त्यानुसार वागणं हा खरा स्त्रीवाद.

साधा विचार करूया. एक शाळा सुरू करायची म्हणजे त्याच्याशी संबंधित कायदेशीर बाबींपासून प्रत्यक्ष विद्यार्थी वर्गात येऊन, त्यांना शिक्षण देण्यापर्यंत सगळ्याच जबाबदाऱ्या आल्या. स्त्रियांना शिक्षणाचा हक्क आहे का? ह्या प्रश्नात बुडून राहिलेल्या व्यवस्थेला वेगळा जाब विचारण्यापेक्षा देवी अहिल्याबाई स्वतः हे कार्य हाताशी घेऊन उतरल्या. आमच्यासाठी दुसऱ्यांनी करावं म्हणून देवी अहिल्याबाई शांत बसल्या नाहीत. त्यांनी स्वतः पुढाकार घेऊन शिक्षणकार्य पुढे नेलं. क्रांतिज्योती सावित्रीबाई फुलेंच्या स्त्री शिक्षणाविषयी असलेल्या ह्याच भावना, समाज म्हणून आपल्याला भावतात. सध्याच्या काळात आपण ज्याला स्टार्ट-अप म्हणतो, तोच हा प्रकार ना? अर्थात, त्यातून अर्थार्जनाची त्यांची अपेक्षा कधीच नव्हती. मात्र पूर्णतः: शून्यातून उभी करायला लागणारी गोष्ट म्हणजेच स्टार्ट-अप. जे त्यांनी करून दाखवलं. हीच गोष्ट

व्यावहारिकदृष्ट्यादेखील ह्या सर्व कामांमध्ये सहभागी असणाऱ्या, अगदी गवंड्यापासून शाळेत शिकवणाऱ्या शिक्षकांपर्यंत अनेक लोकांच्या आर्थिक विवंचनेची सुटका, देवी अहिल्याबाईंच्या ह्या सुधारणांमुळे झाली. एक घाट बांधायला, पुढे रोज त्याचा सांभाळ करायला, हजारो भाविकांच्या दर्शनाची, प्रसादाची सोय करायला केवढा लोक लागेल, ह्याचा विचार झालाच असणार. त्यामुळेच कितीतरी कुटुंब सुखी झाली असतील. लोकांच्या पोटाला अन्न मिळवून देणं, ह्यापेक्षा मोठं पुण्यकर्म कुठलं? मालोजीराव होळकरांचा समाजकारणाचा वारसा पुढे चालवताना देवी अहिल्याबाई समाजाच्या आर्थिक सबलीकरणाबरोबरच, संस्थान म्हणून, सरकार म्हणून संपूर्ण समाजाचे आर्थिक नियोजनदेखील सांभाळत होत्या, हेच ह्यातून दिसून येते.

कोणतीही व्यक्ती, जी स्त्रियांच्या मूलभूत हक्काचा विचार करत असेल, जिला स्त्रियांच्या आयुष्याची किंमत कळली असेल, जी स्त्रियांच्या हक्कासाठी लढू शकेल, जी स्त्रियांच्या हक्कासाठी असेल माझा हरी... हा विचार न करता पुढाकार घेऊन, मैदानात उतरून लढेल, ती स्त्रीवादी. कोणतीही व्यक्ती जिला समाजाची दुखती नस समजेल आणि त्यावर तोडगा काढायचा विचार मनात येईल, त्यावर कृती करायची इच्छा होईल, ती व्यक्ती पुरोगामी. आजपासून तीनशे वर्षांपूर्वीचा काळ म्हणजे नको त्या रूढींनी सोकावलेला, पुरुषसत्ताक. त्या काळामध्ये प्रवाहाच्या विरुद्ध जाऊन एक आदर्श पाठ घालून देणारी व्यक्ती, म्हणजे देवी अहिल्याबाई होळकर. स्त्रियांना स्त्रियांचे प्रश्न अधिक कळतात ह्या विचारांनी, आजच्या शब्दांमध्ये म्हणायचं झालं तर entrepreneur abilities वापरून त्यांनी त्या वेळच्या गरजेनुसार अनेक समाजोपयोगी कामे केली. हाच तर खरा स्त्रीवाद.

आज सोशल मीडियाच्या काळात, केवळ एकमेकांवर चिखलफेक करून खोट्या स्त्रीवादाचा ढोल जगासमोर वाजवण्यात कसला आलाय शहाणपणा? नऊवारी नेसून, डोळ्यांवर गॉगल घालून, बुलेटवरून फिरणाऱ्या सगळ्या स्वयंघोषित रणरागिणी माता-भिगनींनी ह्या अर्थीन देवी अहिल्याबाई होळकर आणि क्रांतिज्योती सावित्रीबाई फुले ह्यांचा आदर्श घ्यायला हवा. अडथळे प्रत्येकासमोर असणार. प्रत्येकाला आपली लढाई स्वतःची स्वतःलाच लढावी लगणार. आजही अनेक कुटुंबांमध्ये स्त्रियांच्या योगदानाला तितकंसं महत्त्व दिलं जात नाही. टीव्ही सारख्या समाजमाध्यमांवरून सासू-सून, जावा-जावा अशी भांडणं दाखवण्यामागे ह्या समाजाचाच आरसा आहे, असं म्हटलं जातं. स्त्रीवाद, पाश्चिमात्य विचारसरणी, आपल्याच विचारांशी, रूढींशी प्रतारणा ह्या सगळ्या गोष्टी म्हणजे पुरोगामीपणाचं लक्षण मानलं जातं आणि नेमकं हेच बदलायची गरज आहे.

अहिल्याबाईंच्या हाती सत्ता आणि पैसे होते म्हणून त्या हे सगळं साध्य करू शकल्या असं म्हणणाऱ्यांना तेव्हाच्या, रस्त्यात काटे घालू शकणाऱ्या प्रवृत्तीचा अंदाज नसावा. आपल्याला खरी प्रगती समजणं आवश्यक आहे. ह्या स्त्रिया शेकडो वर्षांपूर्वी, शेकडो वर्षांनंतरचा विचार करणाऱ्या होत्या. त्यांच्याएवढा कार्याचा डोंगर आपण कधी चढू शकू की नाही त्याची कल्पना नाही, पण त्यांच्या मार्गावर चालत राहण्याचा संकल्प मात्र ह्यानिमित्ताने आपण करूच शकतो.

In Search of the Questions...

Have you ever stopped to ask, "How can we do this differently?" or "Why does this happen this way?" It may sound like a simple question, but it is these very questions that ignite change. Think about it: every significant shift in our society, every groundbreaking business, and every big opportunity that arises has one thing in common—someone asked a question. If we had all asked ourselves, "How can we make this better?" how many things could have changed for the better in our lives, in our communities, and in the way we live? When we talk about entrepreneurship, it's not just about profits—it's about asking the right questions and finding the right answers.

Entrepreneurship often begins with a simple, almost childlike question: Why does it have to be this way? Take Flipkart, for example. The question was simple: "Can Indian customers shop online with the same ease and trust as in the West?" The answer? A resounding yes, and thus began the journey of what became India's first unicorn. Similarly, Ola asked, "Why does booking a taxi have to be so complicated?" and what we see today is the outcome of that search for a better way to do things. It is these questions, small but powerful, that form the very foundation of entrepreneurship.

But here's something we need to acknowledge—entrepreneurship is not just about success; it's about the journey. It's about-facing failure, learning from it, and building something meaningful from



it. Too often, we focus solely on the success stories, but every successful entrepreneur has faced setbacks, doubts, and failures. They've simply had the courage to continue, to keep asking questions, and to keep evolving. When we speak of entrepreneurship, we should speak not only of the financial aspects but also of the societal and cultural implications.

Entrepreneurship in India—A Growing Phenomenon

Now, let's talk about the changing landscape of Indian entrepreneurship. In recent years, India has seen an explosion in the number of startups. By 2023, India registered over 112,000 startups. We now have 108 unicorns—startups that are valued at more than a billion dollars. This is a huge achievement for a country that,

just a decade ago, was more focused on traditional industries and jobs than on entrepreneurial ventures. This growth isn't just about numbers, though; it's about the cultural shift we are witnessing. The mindset is changing. Indian becoming more entrepreneurs are confident, more innovative, and more willing to take risks. But we must recognize that while things are improving, we still have a long way to go.

The Western vs. Indian Entrepreneurial Mindset

This brings me to a crucial point mindset. Have you ever wondered why entrepreneurship flourishes so readily in the West? Why is it that places like Silicon Valley churn out successful startups year after year? The answer lies largely in the mentality of risk-taking and acceptance of failure as part of the process. In the US, over 60% of people prefer the idea of entrepreneurship over traditional jobs. And when a startup fails, it's seen as a learning experience—a stepping stone to future success. The narrative around failure is so different. In the US, failure is seen as part of the journey to success. And it's not just about accepting failure but learning from it, refining the idea, and trying again. But how many of us in India are taught this mindset?

In India, the story is a little different. While we are witnessing a surge in entrepreneurship, we're still working through a mindset that values job security above all. People are still hesitant to take risks. The fear of failure often outweighs the desire to start something new. It's ingrained in us from a young age that a

stable job is the goal, and anything less than that is somehow risky or unreliable. And while we're beginning to see change, there's still a lot of ground to cover.

Why is Risk-Taking Crucial?

We often talk about the importance of capital in entrepreneurship, but there's another aspect that cannot be overlooked: the willingness to take risks. When you look at places like Silicon Valley, or even countries like Israel, the culture of embracing risk is pervasive. In Silicon Valley, it's not uncommon entrepreneurs to fail multiple times before striking gold. In fact, many successful entrepreneurs, like Elon Musk and Steve Jobs, have had multiple failures. But it's that spirit of perseverance, of constantly questioning, that drives them forward. In India, however, we still hold onto the idea that failure is something to be avoided at all costs, and this is where the gap lies.

In fact, consider this—over 70% of people in the West choose to pursue entrepreneurship because it's seen as an opportunity to innovate, to try something new, and yes, to fail and learn from it. But in India, this number is significantly lower. Just 20% of people are inclined towards entrepreneurship, with the rest sticking to traditional employment.

Institutional Support—Is It Enough?

Another key difference between the West and India is institutional support. The US has a thriving ecosystem of incubators, venture capital, and government schemes that support entrepreneurs. **Programs** like Y Combinator, Techstars, and 500 Startups

provide not just funding but mentorship, networks, and infrastructure to help businesses thrive. There's also significant support from the government through initiatives like the Small Business Administration (SBA).

India is not far behind in this regard. We've seen a sharp rise in government-backed programs like Startup India and Make in India, and there has been a noticeable increase in venture capital funding. However, there's a noticeable disconnect between these initiatives and the ground reality. Many startups still struggle to find financial support and mentorship, especially in smaller towns and rural areas. More needs to be done to bridge this gap.

Shifting the Indian Mindset

Here's the thing—mindset change is at the core of this transformation. If we want to see more Indian entrepreneurs rise, we must start by changing how we think about failure, risk, and innovation. It's not enough to just have government schemes or access to capital. What we need is a cultural shift—a shift that encourages people to ask, "How can we make this better?" instead of, "Can this be done?" We need a mindset that celebrates risk-taking and views failure as a part of the learning curve.

Let's also not forget the role of education in this transformation. In the West, entrepreneurship is often embedded in school curricula. Students are encouraged to solve real-world problems and are taught business skills from an early age. In India, 85% of students do not receive formal entrepreneurship training.

But it's changing. We're beginning to see programs and courses dedicated to entrepreneurship in schools and colleges. But these must expand if we are to equip future generations with the tools they need to innovate.

The Future of Indian Entrepreneurship India is on the brink of something exciting. As we witness the growth of sectors like FinTech, EdTech, HealthTech, and Agritech, there's no denying that entrepreneurship is the way forward. But this future will depend on how we, as a society, embrace the entrepreneurial mindset.

We have the talent. We have the resources. All we need is the courage to question the status quo, to innovate, and to embrace failure as part of the journey.

So, to all the aspiring entrepreneurs out there, here's my message: Ask questions. Don't be afraid to fail. Learn from your mistakes, and always, always push the boundaries of what's possible. It is in the search for the right questions that we find the answers that can change everything. The future of Indian entrepreneurship lies in our ability to innovate, question, and above all, believe in the power of asking—"What if?"

Let's create a culture where we stop fearing failure and start embracing the opportunity that comes with asking the most important question of all: How can we make this better?

"Oh, chill, oye. Me too in same deep water as you, but look I am enjoying it. Just now reached my room after a game of hockey. Tell you my thumb hurts." Abhi's casual approach and his mobile addiction for playing hockey, was not new to Montu.

"Tell me, should we join the Perfect Classes for the CET preparation? My current class is way down the popularity charts", said Montu.

Abhi, being the more calm of the two, said very straight forward. "Oye, this class or that class, you need to sort out the junk in your glass. Try to understand the test pattern. First, there are sections in the test. Leave the difficult topic, either way,

we don't stand a chance. Prepare the section that you like most. Second, try to work elimination rather than bv calculation. Just look at the option answers every question has. Pick out the best that appeals to you. Didn't we work on eliminating questions based on our syllabus and later eliminating options based on our preference, till the 12th board examinations? See where we are. We are preparing for the entrance test. I am sure we will get a decent score."

Montu tried to figure out the advice and more doubts cropped up. "Wait man, what about the time that I will take in the mathematical calculation. Do you even remember the formulas? I sat the whole night trying to mug up everything."

"There you are, you dumb, I only think of some logical values, who is going to calculate the answers?" said Abhi.

The above conversation is quite common among the young generation. The examination may be any or at any



level. But one thing is clear. The examination system has changed and incorporated the pattern of multiple choice questions, which is easy to evaluate through systems, in large quantities without any errors. Even school tests have objective and subjective answer patterns. The students try to select an answer from the given option, with guess work taking precedence and at times fetching good marks. Worst, our examination pattern forces a student to select questions that the student has to answer. When this scenario ie questions and answers having options comes to us, I have a few observations:

- 1. We cannot think out of the box as the habit of looking at options limits our thought process.
- 2. We do not prepare ourselves fully for the knowledge that we are supposed to have as there are options in questions themselves.
- We do not focus on the process that goes into deriving that answer as the problem solving time is limited and a derivation would require more time
- 4. We do not give our 100% effort in learning. We focus on getting marks or qualifying examinations, not on learning.

neo-capitalist multi-national, global monopolies and private players are 'deeply seeking' tremendous profits out of digital politics; the core values of democracy become secondary or a negligible thing in front of their trillions of profits. Artificial intelligence is the next version of digital politics and economics. Data economies are ruling the world. Global compulsions have made Indian policymakers pay attention economic disparities and digital divides. India will face such digital burdens in the future. It could lead to a priority turmoil as we are still a developing country. Indian minister recently announced that the Indian version of generative AI will be launched soon. It requires budget provisions. India is dragged into digital



politics due to its huge market size. The agrarian Indian economy is in disturbance, soon it will change its position by changing the priorities of Digital India.
