**Brief Description of the Event:**

The Department of Commerce organized an Industrial / Educational Tour to Satara for TY B.Com and M.Com students. A total of 54 students along with 5 faculty members participated in the visit.

During the tour, students visited **Ajinkya Tara Soot Girni**, where they were given a detailed demonstration of the cotton yarn manufacturing process. Industry experts explained the complete process of processing cotton and converting it into yarn. Students observed various stages such

as cleaning, carding, spinning, and winding, which helped them understand the practical functioning of a cotton yarn mill.

The second visit was to **Satara Mega Food Park**, which is known as one of India's best integrated food parks. The facility processes various agricultural raw materials such as fruits, vegetables, spices, and grains. Students were guided through different processing units where they learned about food processing techniques, packaging, and value addition. The visit also included an overview of modern storage and cold storage facilities used for preserving food products.

The visit provided students with valuable insights into industrial processes and supply chain management in both the textile and food processing sectors.
